London Leads.

Greater New York ranks second city of
the world in population, with London in
the lead. The United States census bureau
on Monday announced the popula-
tion of the consolidated cities, known as
Greater New York, as 3,437,202. This is
gratifying to the pride of the Knicker-
bockers, but it leaves much to be overcome
if they would rival their British competi-
tors. The New York Sun supplies the
following interesting facts:

"Exact comparison with the population
of London, however, is not possible, for its
boundaries are various, according to
various jurisdictions. The old City of Lon-
don, with municipal and parliamentary
limits, has an area of less than seven
hundred acres and its population in 1896
was only 31,148. Registration London or
the district within the registrar-general's
tables of mortality, has an area of nearly
seventy-five thousand acres, and its popu-
lation in 1896 was 4,411,710. The Metro-
politan and City Police Districts London
has an area of nearly four hundred and
fifty acres, extends over a radius of five-
teen miles from Charing Cross, and its
population in 1891 was 5,633,332, and the
present estimate is 6,528,434.

"It will be seen, therefore, that the
population of New York is not much more
than one-half of this estimated popula-
tion of the district of the Metropolitan
Greater London.

"Next after New York and the third
city of the world in magnitude is Paris,
the population of which by the census
of 1896 was 2,536,834, or 900,368 less than
the present population of New York.

"The fourth city in rank is Berlin, with
a population of 1,677,804, in 1895, or less
than one-half that of New York."

MANUAL TRAINING

School In Ch'town—An
Outfit en Route.

J. D. COLLIER DIRECTOR

**Prof. Robertson Meets With
The School Board And
Educationalists.**

On Saturday at noon Prof. Robertson
and Mr. J. D. Collier met with a number
of gentlemen in the School Board Office.
Among those present were Dr. McLeod
Dr. Anderson, Dr. Taylor, Principal Sep-
man, D. C. McLeod, S. Blanchard, Prin-
cipal Landrigan, W. S. Stewart.

Dr. Anderson as chairman stated the
object of the meeting and introduced
Professor Robertson.

Upon rising to address the meeting
Professor Robertson thanked the gentle-
men for the prompt attendance in view of
the short notice. In stating the object of his
visit he referred to his recent visit to Eng-
land and Scotland and the excellent re-
sults of manual training in the schools
there. In support of his contention he
quoted the opinions of a number of the
leading educationalists upon manual
training and all agreed that it had a won-
derful influence. Wherever the system
was inaugurated it had hardly ever been
discontinued. The manual training
schools of Germany are teaching the peo-
ple of that nation to be practical. The
one half day spent per week cannot be
spent to better advantage. Different
industries had been adopted, but now the
one opinion is that woodwork is the
most practical. Afterwards iron work
may be taken up. The course of training
in the three years may include all the
way from 30 to 60 models. Of course draw-
ing goes with the woodwork.

At Fredericton the system was started
in April. The government of New Brun-
swick have asked that the training be ap-
plied to teachers. He had secured a suf-
ficient sum of money to make it a system
of training.

The equipment for one room fitted with
20 benches is now on the way to Char-
lottetown. One set of boys can attend
from 9 to 11, one from 11.30 to 2, one from
3 to 5, for five days. On Saturday the
forenoon should be devoted to teachers.

The school board is expected to provide
a room. Anything further is maintained
for three years by the McDonald Manuel
Training System. During the morning
in company with a number of other gentle-
men he had visited Queen Square and
West Kent Schools. In the former suit-
able accommodation could be secured. If
the proposition was acceptable he was pre-
pared to sign an agreement with the
School Board.

While in England he was fortunate
enough to secure seven experienced men
and two men have also been secured in
the United States. Since then the services
of seven other men have been secured.
All have three years experience with first
class certificates as teachers. He had
brought Mr. J. D. Collier to Prince Edward
Island. He believed Mr. Collier would be
found to be a valuable acquisition to the
community and to the people of the pro-
vince. At the present time the Mc-
Donald Training Schools are being oper-
ated as far west as Winnipeg.

Dr. Taylor then spoke at length upon
the matter and claimed it was the great-
est educational reform of the century.
He hoped Sir William McDonald would
live to see the fruit of the magnificent

Charlottetown) was accidentally shot last
Saturday by some unknown person, who

know it was loaded.

About twelve or more little children
finding his remains on the sea shore, and
being touched with the unfortunate con-
dition of Mr. Kingfisher volunteered to
give him a respectable burial. Nobody
seems to know where Mr. Kingfisher
hails from, or whether he comes from a
good family or not. This is to be regretted,
for there are many sportsmen on the Is-
land who would like to know what Mr.
Kingfisher's record is as a fisherman.

But we will think well of the departed,
and give Mr. Kingfisher credit for catch-
ing many a string of speckled beauties,
ranging from a 1/2 pound to 4 pounds un-

fine combs, covered with tissue paper, and
did very well indeed. Having arrived at
a suitable place, one of the children dug a
grave with a hatchet, after which the re-
mains of Mr. Kingfisher were laid to rest.

inscription upon a flat wooden grave
stone.

Here lies,
Thomas Kingfisher
Who was killed in the bloom of his
manhood.

Fr. Reis of Lou's, Tells Young Women They

in Church.

St. Louis, Aug. 22.—Rev. Fr. G. A. Reis
of St. Liberius' Catholic church, has taken
a radical stand against the open network
shirt waists for women. Here he refused to
communion or any of the sacraments to his
parishioner who wear this garment to
church.

On Sunday last he addressed the sodal-
ity of young ladies on the subject, and
said:

"The young ladies of this sodality will
have to quit wearing those "jigger merrig"
waists with funny things around the arms
and shoulders, or I will refuse to serve
them communion. The fashions are be-
coming entirely too vulgar. No self-re-
specting lady would appear in public in
such an immodest costume. I intend to
set an example to the young ladies of this
parish, and if it is necessary to refuse you
the sacraments I will do it to stop this
vulgar fashion."

The young women are in a high state of
indignation over the pastor's strictness of
the open-faced yoke. In the first stages
of their dismay, they consulted their par-
ents, but got no comfort, as their elders
sided with Fr. Reis.

Miss Emma Schneider is one of the
members of the Young Ladies' sodality.
"None of the girls are a bit pleased with
Fr. Reis," said Miss Schneider today,
"but what can we do for ourselves? I
suppose we will have to abide by his de-
cision, although some of the girls an-
nounce their intention of leaving St. Liber-
ius' church if they were not allowed to
wear what they chose. It was awful
mean of Fr. Reis, but I would not like him
to think so, it might cause ill feeling you
know."
