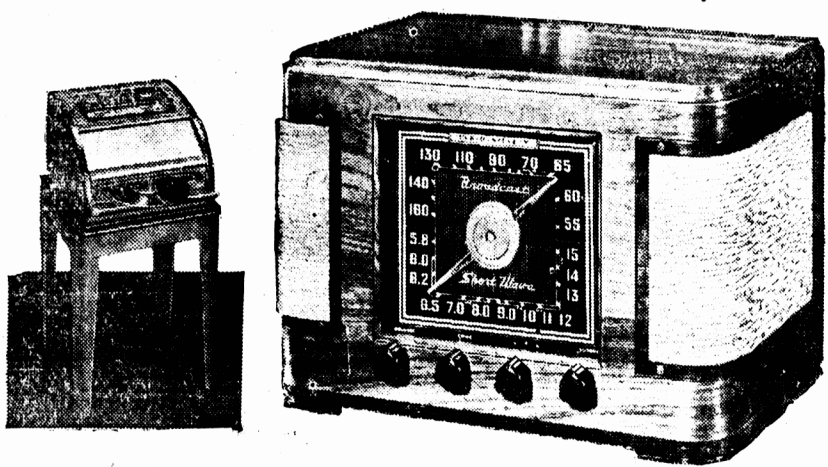

Had Known Accuser Under Other Name

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Aug. 17—Representative Richard Nixon of California said tonight that Alger Hiss has identified Whittaker Chambers, his accuser in the Congressional spy hearings, as a man he had known under a different name.

Nixon gave this information to a reporter by telephone from New York, where three members of the House Un-American Activities Committee said they had brought Hiss and Chambers face to face for the first time for purposes of identification.

Hiss testified that he had known Chambers, who has accused Hiss of being part of a pre-war Communist underground in Washington, as a man named George Crosley.

Chambers testified here under oath that he used to be a Communist from 1924 to 1937, serving as a courier for the underground in Washington.

Visitors Plan Free Drug Plan in New Zealand

By J. C. GRAHAM Canadian Press Correspondent AUCKLAND, N. Z., Aug. 17—A prominent feature of New Zealand's social security structure, the free drugs and medicines scheme, has come under heavy fire recently from prominent overseas visitors.

Under the scheme any medicine prescribed by a doctor is supplied free to the patient on presentation of the prescription form to a druggist. The only exceptions are certain proprietary lines for which the patient must pay.

The noted British authority on social security, Lord Beveridge, commented on visiting New Zealand on the great increase in the consumption of medicine which had followed the introduction of free medicine and expressed the hope that doctors had enough sense to make the medicine harmless.

A United States authority, Dr. W. E. Neal, of Huntington, West Virginia, after an investigation of the Dominion's social security services declared: "Patients receive too much medicine because they demand it. The doctor often prescribes excessively because it is profitable for him to do so. Hence the state pays for services and expensive drugs which the patient would, in many instances, be better off without."

"Checks Patient" To place a conscientious physician in a position that compels him to rush through an afternoon, prescribing for all, not only cheats the patient but exhausts the doctor's time in attempting to perform the mere mechanical phases of his training. Human complaints are too often beyond the realm of medicine and surgery. Merely dosing an individual, mentally burdened from fear, worry, fatigue, or from some economic, domestic or business entanglement, neither relieves nor satisfies the patient's yearning for sympathetic understanding of his fundamental troubles.

The opposition of doctors in Australia to the introduction of a free medicine scheme here has also involved sweeping criticism of the results in New Zealand. It has been claimed that New Zealanders are being converted into a nation of drug addicts. Other Australians have stated that New Zealand bathroom cupboards are filled with half-used bottles of medicine and that doctors find the easiest way to get rid of a hypochondriac is to prescribe something. The result, these critics claim, is that the New Zealand taxpayer has been involved in an annual burden for "free" medicine three times as great as was originally intended.

The New Zealand minister of health, Miss Mabel Howard, has admitted that the increased consumption of medicines and the heavy resulting charges on the fund is causing concern. Not only has the number of prescriptions shown a striking upward trend, she said, "but the department has drawn attention on several occasions to a tendency on the part of a few doctors to prescribe unduly costly drugs."

The New Zealand branch of the British Medical Association, in co-operation with government officials, is examining a number of aspects of the medical services provided under the social security program and it is expected that recommendations will be made to improve the operation of the free medicine scheme.

Russian Teacher In Critical Condition

NEW YORK, Aug. 17 — Mrs. Oksana Stepanovna Kosenkina, Russian teacher in critical condition after her dramatic leap from the Soviet Consulate last week, received a blood transfusion today.

Roosevelt Hospital, announcing the transfusion, said her temperature was 103 degrees and gave the first detailed listing of her injuries.

It said she had suffered fractures of the right thigh, the right knee cap, the right foot, the pelvis and one vertebra. She also has an internal hemorrhage, the bulletin said.

A Soviet consular official tonight accused police of "pure fabrication" in representing that Mrs. Kosenkina does not wish to see Soviet representatives. He said consul-general Yakov M. Lomakin would insist on access to Mrs. Kosenkina's room at the hospital.

Soviet Plan Is Approved

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia, Aug. 17 —The Russian-led Communist bloc tonight approved a Soviet plan for control of the Danube River. The western powers are certain to reject it.

The 11-country conference, meeting as a drafting committee, finished the task of approving a pact which—as Russia put it—is designed to sign the death warrant for the 1921 Danube convention.

The conference will meet tomorrow and Britain, the United States and France plan then to say they will not sign the agreement and may take their case to the international court at The Hague.

URGES HOUSEWIVES TAKE UP ART HOBBY

Although Mrs. Ireland has two children—Audrey, 10, and Peter, six—she finds time to practice sculpturing under the tutelage of Albert Zucca, well-known Montreal sculptor. Before coming to Canada she won two art scholarships in her native England.

Audrey and Peter have found their hobbies already. Audrey has worked as a child model and taken part in plays; Peter, who discovered an aptitude for music, has been taking piano lessons for four months.

HALIFAXIAN RECALLS FIRST EMPIRE FLIGHT

HALIFAX, Aug. 16 —(CP)—It's 30 years and a matter of 500 miles an hour since Mrs. H. A. MacDonald of Halifax saw her first and her most recent demonstrations of flying.

The first was the 30-mile-an-hour hop of the Silver Dart—first plane to fly in the British Empire—piloted by J. A. D. McCurdy, now lieutenant-governor of Nova Scotia.

Recently Mrs. MacDonald witnessed the Royal Canadian Navy Air Section put on a display at nearby Eastern Passage Airport. The feature attraction was a jet Vampire.
