Day Of Thanks Born Of Peace In Old Canada

NOW PERENNIAL, THANKSGIVING IN EARLIER TIMES WAS SET TO MARK VICTORIES OR HAPPY ENDING OF WARS.

Monday is Canada's 60th consecutive Thanksgiving as a Dominion-wide statutory holiday. The first—as an annual celebration—was proclaimed for Nov. 6, 1879 by the Marquess of Lorne, then governor-general, in the second administration of Sir John A. Macdonald.

Distinctly North American as an annual observance it is timely to recall that one of the earliest recorded Thanksgivings proclaimed officially in Canada was for the peace between Britain and France after the Seven Years' War much of which had been fought on Canadian soil. In recognition of this peace in their time the British authorities in Halifax proclaimed Sept. 28, 1763, a Day of Thanksgiving.

A frail thing as between nations in those times peace was soon broken by Napoleon resuming boundaries in Europe. Proclamation of a Thanksgiving Day for Jan. 10, 1799 asked the people of Lower Canada (Quebec) to give praise to receive "The parties of our enemy and the manifold inestimable blessings which our (British) kingdom and our province have received and daily continue to receive." The particular victory referred to was Lord Nelson's defeat of the French on the Nile. Nationally the repulse of American troops invading Canada after the Battle of the Chateaufort was also something to be thankful for.

There is record of an official Thanksgiving Day in Upper Canada (Ontario) in 1812, when Napoleon was safely exiled on St. Helena and the Treaty of Ghent

had sealed peace between Great Britain and the United States after the war of 1812-15—a peace never broken, though sometimes strained, in the ensuing 123 years.

The Pilgrim Fathers are credited with the idea of a Thanksgiving Day as a definite appointment for expressing gratitude for material blessings. Soon after arriving in America from England and following their first harvest from the virgin soil in 1621, they set apart a week-day for attending religious services and giving thanks. It is recorded they frequently carried their shooting weapons to church with them for protection but while at worship they bet many a good dinner to marauding Indians.

Primarily a religious service, it became an annual festival in Connecticut in 1647, Massachusetts in 1690 and New York in 1817. Meanwhile George Washington and various succeeding presidents of the United States named sundry "thanksgiving days for war victories and good crops but seemed difficult about making it a national observance. Andrew Jackson of Carolina, president from 1829 to 1837, like some other southerners, saw "a relic of puritanic bigotry" in the idea. He would have nothing to do with the "Yankee holiday."

In 1864 President Abraham Lincoln appointed the fourth Thursday in November for national Thanksgiving and the holiday has been set annually for that day in the United States ever since.

On Saturday, October 1st, the light but snappy P. W. C. football squad surprised the football fans of Charlottetown, when they defeated the S. D. U. team by a score of 8-5.

On Sunday evening, October 2nd, the Student Christian Movement of Prince of Wales College held their first song service of the season in Heartz Memorial Hall. Alan MacLeod, president of the S. C. M. was chairman and Alton Roberts read the Scripture lesson. Mr. Niall Burnett, a former president of the Movement, addressed the large audience very appropriately. A much appreciated solo was rendered by Mr. Percy D. Williams. The choir was under the direction of Mrs. Francis Holl Trainor.

P. W. C. NOTES

Debating societies have been organized in the Second, Third and Fourth Year Classes at Prince of Wales College. Professor Croteau is director of the debating societies this year due to the absence of P. J. Blanchard, who formerly took a keen interest in this subject. At the organization meetings of the various debating societies, Mr. Croteau addressed the students briefly on the values of debating, he also made several valuable suggestions as to the preparation of debates and he stressed that thorough preparation was necessary in order to have debates of a high standard.

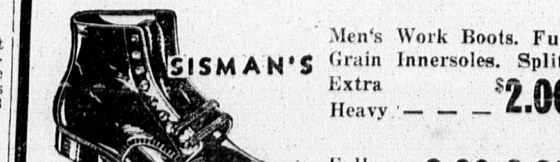

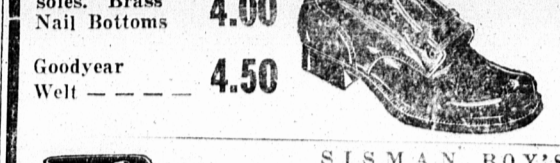
