**BRITISH GOLF COURSES
NOT BEING PLOWED**

DETROIT—In his last letter sent from England Henry Leach sets several things right so far as the golf situation on the other side is concerned. It is learned that golf courses are not being plowed up for vegetables and grain crops; that golf balls are not being turned out at home in large enough numbers to supply the demand of Great Britain, and that there is much more golf being played in Great Britain now than there was during 1915.

As a matter of fact, Leach says that with a plow and states that the links have been constructed a too great an expense for destruction. He also states that he has information that no such agricultural exploit is going to be pulled.

SUPPLY AND DEMAND

There is a demand for many more golf balls than it is possible to make. This arises from the fact that the Government now controls certain of the golf ball manufacturing plants, where there are being turned out things that fly further and faster and do much more damage than a golf ball. In the case of the old ball manufacturers which were left to continue their work labor is very scarce. Hence the shortage.

"On the other hand, there is much more play on the courses at the present time than there was during 1915, when everybody swore off everything regardless of health and all other
