**DOCTORS, DRUGGISTS, AND VENDORS.**

The attention of some doctors, druggists and vendors who may not have read, marked and inwardly digested the amendments to the Prohibition Act which were adopted at the last session of the Legislature, is hereby directed to the following section:

"Subsection 4 of section 4 of the Prohibition Act, 1900 is hereby repealed and the following substituted in lieu thereof:

"Provided also that the sale of intoxicating liquor for exclusively medicinal purposes, or for bona fide use in some art, trade or manufacture may be made by such appointed vendors. Sales may also be made by legally qualified chemists and druggists, but not exceeding twelve ounces at any one sale and for exclusively medicinal purposes only; but such sale whether made by a vendor, chemist or druggist, for medicinal purposes, shall be made only on a prescription or certificate of a duly qualified resident physician affirming that such liquor has been prescribed for the person named therein for use as a medicine and not as a beverage, and no more than one sale or delivery of liquor shall be made on such certificate or prescription, and when such sale is for its use in some art, or manufacture the same shall be made only on certificate, signed by an inspector appointed under

the provisions of this Act, of the good faith of the application, accompanied by the affirmation of the applicant that the liquor is to be used only for the particular purpose set forth in the affirmation and such vendors, chemists and druggists shall file the certificates and prescriptions, and keep a register of all sales made by them indicating the name of the purchaser and the quantity sold. Every inspector appointed under the Act shall have the right to visit the chemists, druggists, physicians and vendors and examine their certificates and prescriptions, and their register of all sales and to see that they are properly filled and recorded, and any physician who gives such certificates or prescriptions for any other than strictly medicinal purposes shall be guilty of an offence against this Act, and shall be liable for the first offence to a penalty of Twenty Dollars and for the second and any subsequent offence to a penalty of Forty Dollars. Provided further that no vendor, chemist or druggist shall permit any liquor to be drunk on the premises of said vendor, chemist or druggist under a penalty not exceeding Twenty Dollars to be enforced under section eleven of the said Act."

The above section has been violated in various ways in its spirit and letter. It is

the intention of the Prosecutor to enforce the penalties of the law against those who hereafter may be found violating the section referred to. The Guardian sincerely hopes that the publication of the section may prevent any such further violations of the law. It would, however, be most unfair to proceed alone against the ordinary liquor seller and permit doctors and druggists to violate the law with impunity.

**BRICKS FOR SALE.**

In the days of "Grimes that good old man" there was a poet who wailed in song his wish for a load of bricks to build his chimney higher, with the object of preventing the naughty male descendants of the aforesaid Grimes from improperly extinguishing his fire. If there are any citizens of Charlottetown who from a similar cause, or for other reasons may desire to extend their chimneys skyward they may apply to the City Council for the necessary load of bricks.

These bricks are not Grimy, as some might be led to suppose from the classical allusion in the opening sentences of this veracious narrative. They are new bricks and they lie in a pile beside the Market Building where they may be inspected, during day light hours by intending purchasers. The reason for the plenitude of bricks in that particular locality is that the City Fathers were minded to build a chimney of brick. The reason why the bricks are not now wanted for that purpose is that the aforesaid Fathers have changed what they call their minds. This must not be mistaken for a change of heart—a much rarer occurrence.

Iron will take the place of brick in the new structure. Paint will give the iron something of the color of the red sand stone. Some day the iron flue may be encased in stone and take the form of a turret, belching smoke. All of which will be subject to such future changes of mind as may occur to the City Fathers. We may yet have a smoke-stack for sale, but it is yet too soon to issue the call for tenders. The subject is a tender one. In the meantime if any secrets of masonry have been unwillingly exposed we beg to tender apologies to the Ancients and Honorable, and we beg to intimate that anything in these few remarks that may seem to be commendatory of the iron chimney is written ironically.

The Patriot finds a timely moral in a regrettable accident on Queen's Square, in which a child was severely hurt by being run into by a bicycle. Our esteemed contemporary failed to see the much greater danger not only to children but larger persons on foot and in carriages, that must have arisen had license been given for speeding fast horses on the Park Roadway during the hours when so many persons visit the Park.

**NAVAL MUTINIES.**

The mutiny on the Russian battleship Khas Potemkin in the Black Sea is not altogether unprecedented. There have been some historic cases of mutiny in the British fleets. In April 1797 there was a mutiny throughout the British fleet at Portsmouth following a demand for increased pay and it only subsided on a promise from the Admiralty, which promise not being quickly fulfilled occasioned a second mutiny. Some lives were lost. The trouble ended in the following month when an act was passed raising the wages and the King pardoned the mutineers. A more considerable mutiny occurred at the Nile in the same year and blocked up the trade of the Thames. The principal mutineers were put in irons and several executed, including the ringleader.

In the year 1800 occurred another mutiny on board the frigate Danae, in which the crew seized the ship and carried her into the French port of Brest. In 1801 there was a serious mutiny in Admiral Mitchell's fleet at Bantry Bay, Ireland. Twenty-two of the mutineers were tried, seventeen sentenced to death and others to receive 200 lashes each. It is to be observed that these troubles occurred in the British navy in the time of Lord Nelson when some of the most famous victories in British naval history were achieved. But those were also the days of the press gang and involuntary service in the navy. In many cases the seamen of the navy were treated with severity and even cruelty, their lot being little better than what the men on the Russian ships endure today.

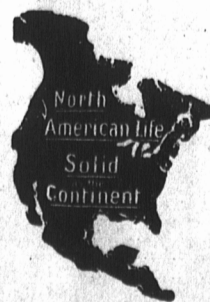
