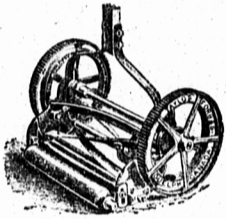

SUPREME COURT AT SUMMERSIDE

The June term of the Supreme Court opened in Summerside at 11 o'clock yesterday morning with His Lordship Justice Fitzgerald presiding. Among the lawyers in attendance besides those from Summerside are Attorney General Palmer, W. B. Bentley, W. S. Stewart, K. C. and J. J. Johnstone, Charlottetown and George Tweedy, Alberton. The Judge in his address to the Grand Jury congratulated the county on the handsome new court house, the most fitting of any in which he had the pleasure of presiding. He had always been in the habit of congratulating the county on the absence of criminal cases. He did not know how many pairs of white kid gloves he had received in the county from the present sheriff. He regretted that on this occasion more serious matters would engage the attention of the court. He briefly reviewed the evidence in the case of the King vs Dougherty. Woodman, Alberton; Jesse Wright, North Bedouque; Ephram Bell, Cape Traverse; C. H. Carruthers, Mill River; James Carruthers, North Bedouque; Jas. Kennedy, Kensington; Louis Holland, Lower Bedouque; Isaac Lowther, Harry Casley, Kensington; Jas. S. White, Alberton.

The Grand Jury in their report found a true bill for murder against Alonzo Dougherty.

They also asked of the court several questions as to what constituted the duties of fence viewers and also as to what constituted legal fence.

They also referred to the disgraceful manner in which the Prohibition law is being enforced by which one man should be sent to jail for an offence against the prohibition law and another man for the same offence be allowed to go almost free.

The judge in reply complimented the jury on their work of bringing up such matters before the court. He explained to them the law as laid down in the statutes as regarding the duties of fence viewers and as what constituted legal fence. As to the enforcement of the Prohibition law it was simply disgraceful if such man should be sent to jail for an offence against the prohibition law in the poor manner in which the law is being enforced and hoped that now that the attention of the Attorney General had been called to this matter that the law would be strongly carried out in the future.

After thanking the grand jury for their attendance and their report he dismissed them.
