At the meeting of the National Boys' Work Board held recently in Toronto, leaders from all parts of Canada were present and devoted several days to the discussion of various matters in connection with the Tuxes and Tull Ranger work. An interesting feature in the proceedings was a luncheon at the King Edward Hotel at which a number of leading men representative of the best element in Canada had heard reports from the Secretaries engaged in the Provincial fields.

At this luncheon the acting secretary for the Maritime Provinces reported that there were 130 Trail Rangers carrying out the C. S. E. T. programme in these provinces. In these groups there are at least 3,000 boys who are in training for service in Church and Community. These Squares and Camps are organized in 60 communities in Nova Scotia, 29 in New Brunswick and 27 in Prince Edward Island, making a total of 116 places in which the Churches are helping their boys develop into a fine manhood.

An analysis of the figures reveals the fact that the C. S. E. T. work is making splendid progress in the rural communities—that it is in fact peculiarly adapted to meet the needs of boys and churches in the country places.

Eight Conferences were held during the winter at Halifax, Charlottetown, Moncton, New Glasgow, Kentville, Shelburne, Chatham and MacAdam. At these conferences 670 boys and 105 leaders spent two days discussing better methods of C. S. E. T. work and various matters of peculiar interest to teenage boys. A unique testimony to the value of C. S. E. T. was found in the significant fact that of the boys who belonged to camps or squares, over 50 per cent are church members and of these who had not caught the vision of the Christian life as presented through this program of fourfold development, only about 25 per cent were church members.

Three splendid camps were held during the year, attended as follows: Big Cove, N. S., 54; Chipman, N. B., 46 and North Bedouque, P. E. I., 35. A camp was also held for Boys' Leaders at Wallace, N. S., and a very helpful series of Training Institutes were held at Moncton, St. John, Amherst, New Glasgow and Halifax in which 180 men were enrolled.

At the National Board meeting, it was enthusiastically decided to promote the C. S. E. T. programme with greater energy and to that end far-reaching plans were made for the more effective organization of the National and Provincial Boards; the revision of the Mentors' Manual and addition of new badges; and the holding of Boys' Parliaments in the various Provinces to be followed as soon as practicable by a National Parliament of the leading boys from all parts of Canada.

Plans are now maturing for a splendid series of Training Camps to be held at Big Cove, N.S. June 30th to July 9th; North Bedouque, P. E. I., July 10th to 20th; Chipman, N. B. July 16th to 27th and in Southwestern Nova Scotia, August 7th to 17th. These camps will be under the leadership of the best men available, with Messrs. Strother, Machum, Milligan and Gregg as directors. The M. E. B. is fortunate in securing the services of Mr. A. B. Horwood, Boys' Work Secretary of the St. John Y. M. C. A., who will give two months to the setting up and management of these camps.

Thought Money Was Counterfeit

NEW YORK, May 29.—That Michael J. Sullivan, general manager of the Canadian Shipping Co., Salem, Mass., threw overboard from the liner Homeric fifteen hundred perfectly good dollars in the belief that they were counterfeits, is the fixed belief of United States Secret Service operatives here today.

Sullivan's baggage was searched when the Homeric docked yesterday and operatives elicited from him the story of how he came to cast away so much real money. Last December a schooner outside the three-mile limit made an \$1,800 sale of booze to an American. The rum runner went to Nova Scotia, where she broke down and the remainder of the "goods," plus cash receipts, were sent to Glasgow by another boat. At the Scottish port the \$1800 in \$10 bills were turned over to Sullivan. Since thousands of dollars in counterfeit money had reached the United Kingdom as payment for booze, Sullivan tested the money by putting a number of the bills in tea. They split—a sign that they were spurious. He noted other indications of their not being genuine, so taking one hundred and fifty of them he threw them overboard in disgust, bringing back thirty of them to show the folks back home how easy people could be stung in Great Britain. One night aboard the Homeric he showed the bills to several passengers, who, however, were sure that they were not

To Increase Their Price To Two Pence MOOSE JAW, Sask., May 29. Charged with making a seditious speech at a meeting of grain growers in January last, Fred McIntyre, a farmer of the Royal George school district, south of Caron, Sask., was recently committed for trial here.

The operatives are quite convinced that Sullivan fed fifteen hundred dollars to the hungry waves and that this cash was real honest-to-goodness United States money.

N. Y. DRUG SEIZURES

GENEVA, May 28.—The Spanish and Canadian Governments today supplied the secretariat of the League of Nations with the

details of the recent seizures in New York of two cargoes of opium and other narcotic drugs. The Spanish Government said a large quantity of morphine, discovered by the American customs officials in barrels labelled "smoked fish" came from Marseilles and only touched at Malaga, Spain, and was not embarked there. The Canadian Government stated that four cases of alleged "incandescent lamps" but which contained 1,000 pounds of morphine in tubes, were shipped from Holland destined for Montreal, and were legally intercepted by the United States. It was added that these official facts should be taken as proof that the vigilance of the United States in searching for contraband drugs was justified.
