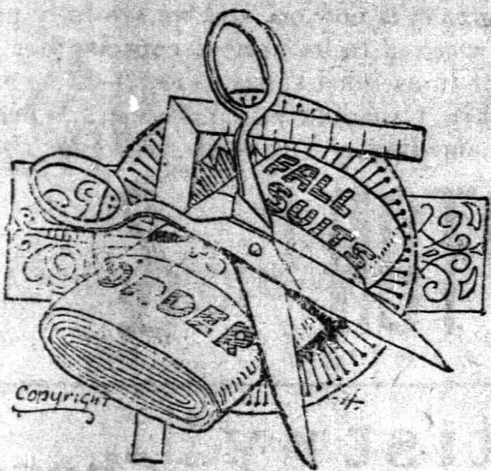

LOCAL LEGISLATURE.

FRIDAY, May 25.

House met at 12.30.

Mr. A. A. McLean asked the Commissioner of Public Works whether it is the intention of the Government to open a new road from Alexandria, Lot 49 to Lot 48 Road; and for what purpose was the \$25 mentioned in the Public Works Report, 1899, paid to Daniel McLellan?

Hon. Jas. R. McLean said that it is the intention of the Government to carry the road through. The road has been surveyed.

Mr. John A. McDonald asked the Leader of the Government if it is the intention of the Government to pay John Hickey the sum of fifteen dollars as agreed upon, for lands taken for the purpose of opening up a new Road from the Main Road to the shore of Darnley River?

Hon. Mr. Farquharson said that the money had been paid. The sum of \$25 was paid for a right way.

Mr. Campbell asked if the Leader of the Government has any work ready? if not the members want to go home and work on their farms.

Hon. Mr. Farquharson was glad that the Hon. member was willing to get down to business. It will depend on how much Mr. Campbell talked.

On motion of Mr. Farquharson the bill to incorporate the Cornwall Creamery Co. was read a third time and passed.

On motion of Mr. Birch the bill to incorporate the Hall Company of the Tignish branch of the Catholic Mutual Benefit Society was read a third time and passed.

On motion of Mr. A. A. McLean the bill to incorporate the Central Christian Church of Charlottetown was read a third time and passed.

On motion of Mr. Farquharson the bill to incorporate the Trustees of the Hampton Hall was read a third time and passed.

Hon. Mr. Farquharson said that the work of the session would be completed next week if the House adjourned Monday.

Mr. Campbell said that would be more courteous if the Premier had told the House on Wednesday that there was no business on to be transacted.

Mr. Farquharson said that unforeseen circumstances had taken place and it was useless to have a session in view of the celebration in the city.

Mr. Shaw said the leader of the Government knew of the celebration and now should go on with the Budget.

Mr. J. A. McDonald and Mr. M. McKinnon strongly condemned the proposed adjournment.

House adjourned until 10 o'clock Monday.

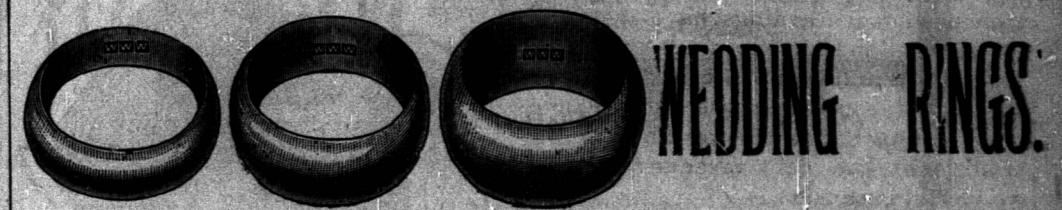
