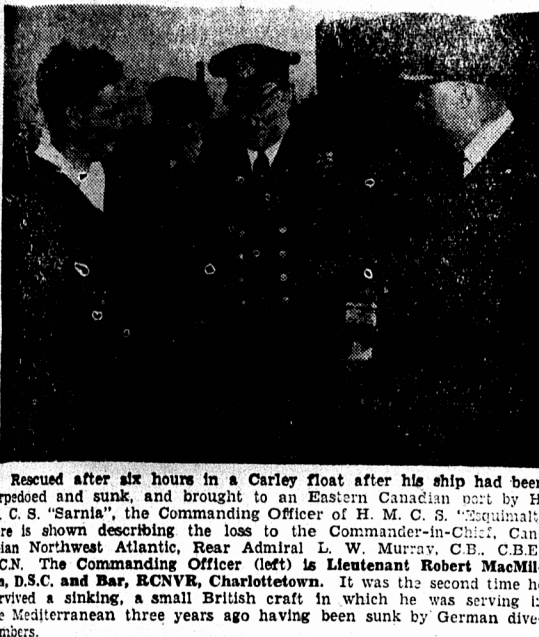

Mr. Harris spoke comforting words from John's Gospel: "The dead shall hear His voice. There are left to mourn the loss of a kind and loving mother one son, George, who cared for his mother in her declining years; also six daughters, namely, Mrs. Jessie Earman, Virginia; Mrs. Clifford Scott, York Point; Mrs. Gordon Thompson, Cornwall; Mrs. Mary Ann Macdonald, Augustine Cove; Mrs. Frank Luque, Crapaud, and Mrs. Heber Sherrin, Augustine Cove. One son, Bruce, and three daughters predeceased her several years ago. Hymns sung were the 23rd Psalm, "Jesus Lover, My Soul"; "The Sands of Time are Sinking"; "How Bright That Blessed Hope Jesus Will Come"; and "Man of Sorrows What A Name".

The family mourn not as those without hope for they know their mother died in the full assurance of His glorious resurrection. She has gone to be with those who sing that new song.
