Report of the Work done Wednesday.

The following Committee, with the president and secretary of the Association, was appointed to attend the meeting of the National Sabbath School Convention to be held at Atlanta, Ga., on the 27th of April: Rev. Geo. Manifold, J. K. Ross, D. Montgomery.

Rev. D. Price delivered a capital address dealing with the Sabbath school as an evangelical force.

The evening session which was preceded by a half hour devotional service led by Mr. D. Montgomery of Alberton, opened at 7.45 with the president, Rev. Mr. Raymond in the chair. The minutes of previous session being then called for were read and adopted.

After singing, Rev. W. J. Howard was called upon. He read a most excellent and well prepared paper on "The Teacher's Equipment." The important points made were (1) Patience possessed of the teacher to combat with the rough and uncouth nature of the untutored boy. (2) Spiritual interest in the scholars' welfare. (3) Loyalty to the church in general. (4) Loyalty to one's own church and denomination. (5) Exclusion of selfishness and the great necessity of entire willingness to work.

The financial committee then submitted its report which showed—there being no balance over from last year—receipts of \$54.74 and expenses of \$160.21, including estimated expenses leaving a debt of \$105.47 minus the collection of the evening which amounted to about \$30, one third of which is pledged.

Rev. A. Lucas then addressed the meeting on the financial support of S. S. work. The black-board was used most efficiently in showing the order in which the work should be organized. The speaker drew a circle in which was placed in this order, as the order of importance: Provincial Association, Township Association and County Association. As lines of work diverging from this circle, there was placed in the following order: Organization, education, evangelization, co-operation and sustentation. Each of these phases of the work was separately and plainly dealt with, emphasis being laid especially on the last.

The closing address, which was a most powerful one, was given by Rev. J. D. Freeman. He dealt chiefly with the opportunity afforded all those engaged in this great work, the seriousness and importance of having such opportunities within our reach. Opportunity is the twin sister of impatience, for as soon as the former is grasped the latter steps in and pushes the work to a successful immediate issue. To make the best of these opportunities the pastor and superintendent must unite in a holy plot to secure the conversion of every scholar in the school, and each teacher must be filled with the spirit of evangelization. We must recognize that each boy and each girl has his or her work. The boy can bring his chum and the girl her companion to the Saviour.

The consecration of the teachers' home was emphasized. Consecrate some room of your home and devote it to the boy of your class. It will be here you can get them to open their hearts to you when they would not do so in their own home.

And above all is needed the baptism of the Holy Ghost upon us all. The last words of the speaker were very fervent and left a deep impression upon the meeting, one that would effectually tell in the toil and labor of the coming year. After singing "God be with you till we meet again," the convention closed with the benediction.

ROYAL ART GALLERY.

Grand Display of Curiosities and Art Works

THE Royal Art Gallery was visited by a large number of people yesterday afternoon and evening and it is safe to say that their were none in attendance who were not surprised at the display. The greatest surprise was that such a collection of curiosities of various kinds and so many works of art, old and recent, could be gathered in the Y.M.C.A. from but a few places on P.E. Island.

Books and paintings as old as 300 years. Besides the large number of old ones there were also many late drawings, engravings and paintings which would do credit to museums of larger cities. One article particularly interesting to citizens is the first deed of the first Post Office built on the Island and which bears the signature of Governor Fanning. This Post Office was situated on Water St., near the foot of Prince St. Other things to be seen were, Luther's commentary on St. Paul's epistle to the Galatians, which was printed in 1635; a Bible, the smallest size in the world; which is 1 1/2 inches long, 1 inch wide and but one half inch thick; a silk shawl 200 years old; a silk shawl which once belonged to the Duke of Wellington's grand niece as well as a picture of the Duke's niece and a bracelet made from her hair; a small pitcher made from \$3,000 in green-backs at the time the slaves were set free in the South. A magnificent vase made from lava from the volcano Vesuvius; a brooch taken at the siege of Delhi and another taken in the Crimean war. China dishes used in the field of the battle of Waterloo; old axes of the French period of P. E. Island. Petrified fruits and a large number of various other curiosities, ancient and modern too numerous to mention. A large crayon picture, the artistic work of a small boy is an excellent piece of handwork and was greatly admired. There is also on exhibition a splendid collection of minerals of various species which are a picture of rare beauty. It would tax too much the space available to enumerate the many articles of interest; and can only be appreciated by viewing for one's self. Tables that would do honor to royalty were spread by the ladies of Grace church and advantage was taken by the eager appetites created by the tempting delicacies.

The Art Gallery will be open this afternoon from 1 until 4 o'clock and in the evening from 7 until 10 o'clock, when pictures by leading artists and several other articles will be sold. The tables will be laden with eatables to suit all tastes.
