Directs a Telegraph Company

WHICH HE ORGANIZED

In Maine—Is a Native of Murray Harbor, P. E. Island.

CALAIS, June 30.

A competitor of the New England Telephone Company has appeared, and its line in this city will be open for business about July 2, when the citizens of this city will be enabled to talk with parties in the towns of Princetown, South Princetown, Brookton, Waite, Talmage, Alexander, Danforth, and other places hitherto out of reach by wire.

The new concern, which is known as the Lakeside Telephone & Telegraph Company was organized at Princetown in 1897, as the Princetown Telephone & Telegraph company with a capital of \$10,000, the name being in the following year changed to Lakeside. Under charter granted under general laws the company has the right to extend its line from Houlton to Machias, through the towns of Hodgdon, Amity, Danforth, Brookton, Waite, Talmage, Indian Township, Princetown, Alexander, Baileyville, Baring, Calais, Charlotte, Dennysville, Cooper, Meddybemps, Crawford, Wesley, Marshfield; also from Toppsfield to Kingman through Kossuth, Carroll, Springfield, Webster, Prentiss, Drew and Winn.

Lemuel Brehaut, who is president and general manager of the Lakeside company was born in Murray Harbor, Prince Edward Island, in 1832, and was the son of H. J. Brehaut, collector of customs at the outpost of Murray Harbor, who has held office since that province entered confederation. Lemuel was educated in the public schools and at Prince of Wales College and normal school in Charlottetown, P. E. I. In 1853 he began the study of medicine in the University of the city of New York medical department, and graduated in 1857.

In March of the same year he began practice at his birthplace, where he remained until 1861, when he emigrated to the United States and settled in Princetown, Me., where he resumed his practice

A HORRIBLE HOLOCAUST.

Tells the Story of Foreigners in Peking—Butchered and Burned.

PRINCE TUAN'S MOST HORRIBLE CRUELITIES

Butchers 4,000 Chinese who Made a Plea for Mercy to Foreigners—Viceroy Murdered by Boxers—Canton Quiet—Japan Ready to Send Troops—Chinese Legation in Paris Closed.

THE WORST FEARS CONFORMED.

LONDON, July 7.—(Special).—Reports from China are very conflicting. A Shanghai dispatch dated the 6th says the massacre of foreign Ministers, women, children and European Guards at Peking after eighteen days of hopeless resistance, is confirmed.

BUTCHERY FOLLOWED BY FLAMES.

When their ammunition and food were exhausted the Chinese fiends closed in upon the Legation and butchered all who remained alive. Afterward they set fire to the Legation buildings and the remains of the victims were consumed in one horrible holocaust.

TUAN'S BLOODY REIGN.

It is not stated what source the news comes from. Reports of the atrocities committed by Prince Tuan upon the Chinese are appalling. He had 4,000 leading Chinese butchered for merely daring to petition him to control the orgies of blood.

under adverse conditions in May of that year.

Realizing the necessity of having telephone communication with the towns outlying from Princetown and being fully satisfied of the advantage to be derived therefrom for professional and commercial purposes, he organized the Princetown Telephone & Telegraph Company, and although far from possessing wealth with which to work, he started the line in 1897 under conditions which would have discouraged nine out of every ten men. He was determined to succeed, however, and worked night and day unceasingly until he succeeded in getting his line built and equipped from Princetown to Alexander, a distance of 12 miles, which was extended the following year to Brookton, 25 miles from Princetown, and in 1899 to Danforth, 12 miles further; all being accomplished under most trying conditions.

In 1899 Milton also was reached, and Dr. Brehaut applied to the board of aldermen of Calais for permission to erect poles and wires in the city proper. His petition was opposed, and when the question came up for discussion it was defeated. Nothing daunted the worthy doctor tried again, and after various delays and changes in the route mapped out, his petition was granted and the work of building the line is about completed.

Dr. Brehaut contemplates putting in a large number of instruments in Calais and Milton, some of which are already in place waiting for the wires, and a large local system at moderate rates is among the possibilities of the near future.

The line as it exists to-day is of great value to the lumbermen having interests in the towns through which it passes, and to business interests generally. Rates at present range from \$15 to \$40 annually, according to portion of line used.

No Siberian Exile Now.

St. Petersburg, July 5.—The Official Messenger to-day publishes an imperial ukase providing in a large measure for abolition of banishment to Siberia.
