A NOTED MASON DEAD.

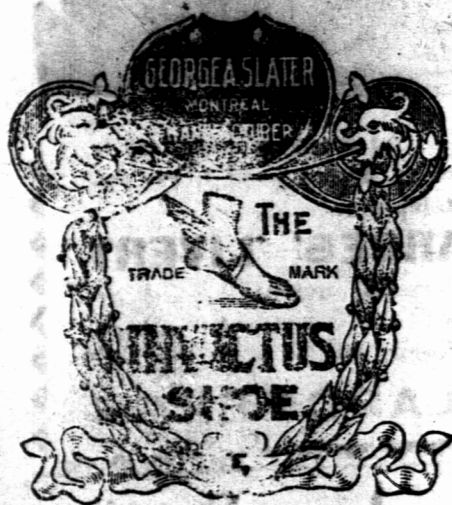

City Council Met Last Night

The regular monthly meeting of the City Council was held last night, His Worship Mayor Warburton and all the Councillors being present.

The Bill presented by Messrs. Johnson & Johnson, for antitoxine, created considerable discussion and resulted in the following resolution passing. Moved by Coun. Kelly and seconded by Coun. Brown and carried unanimously:

Resolved that upon the presentation of a certificate by a duly registered physician, in attendance that the patient or family suffering from a contagious disease, and unable to pay for necessary medicines or treatment, that an order be given by the Health Officer to any druggist in the city of Charlottetown to furnish the necessary medicines the physician may deem necessary to prescribe, the payment of said account be subject to approval of the city Council. This resolution shall not in any way include fees for professional attendance.

The bills then passed with the exception of one of them which was outside city limits.

The Clerk then read the draft address to the Duke of Cornwall.

Coun. Whear in response to an enquiry stated that at a meeting of the Executive Council to be held during the present week an address would be prepared for presentation.

Councillor McDonald moved second by Coun. Brown that His Worship the Mayor and Coun. Whear be a committee to proceed to Halifax to make presentation. Coun. Kelly wanted to know who was going to pay the expenses of the delegation.

Coun. Lyons condemned the Government for not asking the Duke and party to visit this province and contended the people of the province had been slighted. The Prince of Wales had visited the city and it was a historic fact.

Couns. Kelly, Whear, Brown, Tanton Horne spoke upon the matter. Upon a vote being taken Couns. Horne, Lyons, and Kelly voted against sending a delegation. During the discussion those in favor of delegation and adverse to it presented their contentions in a vigorous manner.

A communication was read from Mr. J. C. McDonald asking for exemption from taxation as he did not come under the milk vendor's by law. The matter was referred to the Recorder.

A communication was read from the solicitors of the owners of the block known as the London House and a similar letter was read from Mr. R. B. Norton referring to the stone walls in front of those business houses. It was decided that in the Norton case the City would relay the wall. A precedent was laid down that in future the applicant must bear half the cost.

Coun. Tanton moved that a new wall be placed on the east side of Pownall street between Flizroy and Euston street and also the finishing of the grading and cleaning of the gutters on Passmore street.

After discussion it was decided to have both pieces of work attended to at once. Coun. Whear intimated that the street in front of Victoria Row would be macadamized during fall.

Coun. Lyons enquired about the storage of oil. Former communication on the matter were looked up but it was decided to hold the matter over for a future meeting. It was pointed out that the present conditions are decidedly unfavorable.

DOCTORS ALL HOPEFUL OF PRESIDENT'S CASE.

They Say it Presents No Single Unsatisfactory Feature

CRISIS IS EXPECTED TO BE REACHED TO-DAY

Bullet Not Yet Found—King Edward's Message—Talmage's Strong Words—Chicago Poles Denounce the Crime— Socialists Refuse Regret—Emma Goldman Wanted by Police—Sympathy the World Over.

THE DOCTORS ARE HOPEFUL.

BUFFALO, Sept. 9.—(Special.)—The doctors still incline to a hopeful view of the President's condition and insist that it does not present a single unsatisfactory feature.

HOW THE PRESIDENT IS NOURISHED.

The President is being nourished by injections of whiskey, hot water and raw eggs. He is clear headed.

TO-DAY THE CRITICAL ONE.

The crisis is expected to be reached on Tuesday. The bullet has not been seen or felt.

All the doctors seem to consider the chances of recovery excellent.

PRESIDENT'S BROTHER ARRIVED.

Abner McKinley, brother of the President, arrived from Denver to-day.

SOCIALISTS HAVE NO REGRET.

CHICAGO, Sept. 9.—(Special.)—A thousand Socialists here voted down a resolution of regret at the President's attempted assassination on the ground that McKinley is a representative of the capitalist class and that his safety or danger is a matter no concern to them.

POLES DENOUNCE THE CRIME.

The Chicago Poles denounced the crime and regretted that the would-be murderer claimed to be of their race.

DR. TALMAGE'S STRONG WORDS.

NEW YORK, Sept. 9.—(Special.)—Preaching at Ocean Grove to an immense congregation Rev. Dr. Talmage said he wished the policeman who first seized

the assassin had dashed his brains out with the pistol butt. The congregation applauded the sentiment.

EMMA GOLDMAN IS WANTED.

The police are looking for Emma Goldman who is believed to be in hiding in St. Louis.

THE ENTIRE WORLD'S SYMPATHY.

Strong expressions condemning the crime and expressing hopes for the President's recovery are being received from all parts of the world.

THE FEELING IN ENGLAND.

LONDON, Sept. 9.—(Special.)—Genuine relief prevails throughout England over the encouraging reports regarding President McKinley's condition and prospects of recovery.

Were King Edward lying wounded popular feeling could scarcely be stronger or deeper.

PRAYERS FOR THE PRESIDENT.

Prayers for the recovery of the President were offered in hundreds of churches yesterday, notably in St. Paul's Cathedral, Westminster Abbey and Canterbury Cathedral.

THE KING'S MESSAGE.

BUFFALO, September 9.—(Special.)—The following message from King Edward to the President of the United States has been received:

"Am horrified beyond words at dastardly attemptation upon life. My best and warmest good wishes and most earnest hopes for your recovery.

(Signed) "Edward."

TEACHERS' CONVENTION.

On Wednesday Thursday and Friday of this week there will be held in this city a meeting of more than ordinary interest. The teachers of this province will on the days indicated meet in annual convention. They come to us not with banner, drum and street parade but quietly and unobtrusively will they meet and discuss questions of vital importance to thousands in our island home.

For little attention has been given the teachers in the past by the general public especially by those who should be intensely interested in their work, viz the parent and also the politician. They certainly have no reason to complain that the politician does not have something to say and do with the question of Education, the effect of their doing the teacher feels and oftentimes keenly. But what is referred to is that the politician does not meet and confer with the teachers on matters educational.

A glance at the table of contents of this year's program is sufficient to convince any one that the subjects that will be discussed are of the very first importance to all engaged in the work of teaching and also to those who are being taught. In this list is found "Nature Studies" a subject that receives little or no attention in our schools, but one that calls loudly for full recognition on all school curriculums in this the first year of a new century. "Child and Nature" is also on the list. It is to be hoped as a result of the discussion of this subject that the aim of the school will in the future be to get the child back to nature rather than drawing him away therefrom as has been too much the tendency in the past. "The relation of the Teacher to the Community" is another subject. Too often the teacher feels that he has alone to do with the school, but every true teacher realizes that he has also a duty to the community.

ity in which for the time being he resides. If that relationship is more fully realized and acted upon by the teacher as a result of this discussion the communities will be under deep obligation to this teachers' convention for having introduced and discussed so practical a subject. "Practical Training for Teachers" is also a subject for discussion and of all on this excellent program this is the most important. In this Province we do not have any efficient training for our teachers but trust that this outrageous state of affairs will not continue much longer. "Artist or Artizan, Which?" The discussion of this subject will bring out to us what is and what should be the aim of the public school. "How to teach History," truly an important subject, as how to teach anything on the school course must be. "Child and Man" also important; "Manual Training, its Outlook in P.E.I." Are we utilizing the McDonald gift in manual training as much as we might is a question occupying the minds of some. The discussion of this question will tend to answer that question.

Not only in selection of subjects but also in the choice of persons to lead in these discussions is there promise of a more than ordinary interesting Convention. Among those who read papers we notice the names of Mr. John McSwain, Col. Francis W. Parker, of Chicago, Chief Supt. Education Anderson, Wm. V. Newson M. Sc. Judge Warburton, Mr. J. D. Collier of the MacDonald Manual Training School.

Two years ago the managing Committee of the Teachers' Association took a forward step in the matter of making the conventions interesting and profitable. In that year they secured the services of Hon. W. W. Stetson, State Supt. of Education for Maine. His inspiring addresses are still remembered with profit by many teachers. Last year following the example set the previous year, Hon. Frank Hill, Secretary of the Board of Education was present. The philosophical and cultured addresses delivered on this occasion by Mr. Hill are still an inspiration to a number of our teachers. This year the celebrated Col. Francis W. Parker of Chicago has accepted the invitation of the Executive to be present and take part in the proceedings. Col. Parker has for many years stood in the very forefront among the Educationalists of the neighboring republic. His work in the Quincy schools almost a quarter of a century ago brought him into prominence, which prominence has been held by him to the present day. The privilege of listening to so noted a worker in the great cause of education comes to many engaged in the work of teaching for once in a lifetime, to some never. Every one, teacher, parent, public man, should make it a point to attend the P. E. I. Teachers' Convention on the 11th, 12th and 13th inst.

During the three days of the Teachers' Convention, there will be an Exhibition of Manual Training Work at the Queen Square School.

It will include specimens of Woodwork and Drawings executed by the pupils of Queen Square and West Kent Schools in this City; and of the scholars attending the Summerside Schools.

In addition there will be examples worked by the Prince of Wales College Students, the City Public School Teachers, and Summerside School Teachers.

A full set of Exercises and Models, comprising the System adopted by the London (England) School Board in the instruction of many thousands of boys, will be on view.

The System of Woodwork known as Sloyd, and taught in most of the Schools in Sweden, will also be illustrated with a comprehensive set of Models; many of which were made in that country.

These should be of special interest, as from them most of the Woodwork Systems now in vogue in several countries, were derived.

One or more of the teachers will be in attendance each of the days—Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday, during the Convention; throughout the following hours—10 a.m. to 1 p.m., and 2 to 5 p.m., to receive Visitors and offer any required explanation and information.

All Teachers would do well to make a call and see some of the results of a branch of School Education which is making great progress everywhere; as a distinct idea of Manual Training, its aims and practice, is hardly attainable by reading accounts in newspapers and periodicals.

The general public, especially those whose children are being taught this work, are cordially welcome to visit the School and inspect the collection.
