NEW YORK, Jan. 26—(AP)—Sonja Henie, rated by her handlers as the most superbly trained girl athlete in history, has found the movie grind so tough the may toss it and a two-year income of about \$400,000 into the ash can.

The Norwegian swan of the ice, whose secret is almost limitless stamina, has requested Twentieth Century-Fox to rip up her contract unless its directors permit her standardized working hours instead of a strain that lasts deep into the night. Her ultimatum came after her last picture, "Happy Landings," when she collapsed and fainted on the set.

"I can't stand that strain—working from early morning to seven or eight o'clock at night—and do not intend to do so," she said.

Sonja was further irritated by the request of her film employers that she give up her current exhibition tour. To the plea of her movie handlers that she was "an actress," she replied:

"Don't kid me. I'm still a skater." And to prove it, the petite Norwegian skated on the ice in a show that is a complete five-night sellout. Her present tour has been so successful, says Manager Hugo Quist, that she could pile up a gross of \$1,000,000 a month by skating five days a week, which she is able to do.

Sonja, so far, has made three smash hit movies, her fortune from the proceeds and her exhibitions amounting to \$850,000 mark in less than two years.

On the movie set, she claims to have the hardest and cruelest job of any. She arises each morning at 4 a. m., spends two hours at the makeup artist's table, and then begins to skate. The entire day, she says, she skates, spins and jumps and she likens it to a runner doing the mile over and over all day.

Lefty Gomez Joins Growing Holdout List

NEW YORK, Jan. 26—The rapidly growing list of major league baseball salary holdouts has acquired another conspicuous recruit Vernon (Lefty) Gomez, southpaw ace of the world champion Yankees and No. 1 pitcher of the American League of effectiveness. At Reno, Gomez revealed yesterday he had been offered a \$150,000 contract, representing an increase of \$15,000.

Like most other Yankee contracts this is considered the club's "opening bid." Gomez, whose pay was cut from \$20,000 to \$13,500 last year after two mediocre seasons, made a sensational comeback in 1937. He won 21 games, against 11 defeats, and led all pitchers with an earned run average of 2.33 per game.

He was the strikeout king of the majors, with 194 victims, and topped off his year by beating the Giants twice in the World Series.

Gomez joined two team-mates in the holdout class, Joe DiMaggio and George Selkirk, both outfielders. DiMaggio not only turned down a \$25,000 offer representing a \$10,000 raise, but jolted the Yankee front-office by demanding \$40,000.

Even the Giants, famous for being one of the happy families, have uncovered two holdouts, outfielder Hank Leiber and catcher Harry Danning. Leiber was a casualty last year.

DiMaggio today shows 31 snowed-out holdouts in the two major leagues, with a number of prospects still to be heard from. The Chicago White Sox, with seven known holdouts, lead the list.

Article By Bill Terry Irks Scribes

NEW YORK, Jan. 26—"Tearable" Terry has opened his eyes in print and it's war to the finish. His magazine article, on Saturday, touches off a bomb that's one to blow something or someone to bits.

His article, on Saturday, touches off a bomb that's one to blow something or someone to bits. It's just an innocent story about Terry the "marry" but it's a bristling challenge to baseball writers.

Outwardly, Horatia Alger could not have done a better writing job for his most loved hero than Bill Terry did for Bill Terry. To fans who do not know the "inside" of the New York Giant manager's triumph, and temper, it was written by a piece-about a ball player who overcame big obstacles. It featured digs at baseball writers whom he did not have the courage to name.

The whole article might have been passed over by the baseball press as so much pop-off if it were not for the general reactions on the honesty of the writer who did the Giant beat during the stormy days when Terrible Terry broke all rookie rules by holding out for more money.

Terry claimed the writers worked hand in hand with John McGraw by telling the world that Terry was just another ball player who was "bought" by McGraw and maybe he didn't even mean that. But the writers think it was a blow of the foulest type.

Terry in his article, writes voluminously on the effort of New York sports editor to get his telephone number. "I never mix business and my family affairs," the Colonel says. Yet, he writes his story and brings in his family from his wife to his youngest son.

Giving sports editors home telephone numbers is common in the trade. Such numbers are not wanted to get "exclusive" stories as Terry claims but for checking purposes. All too often, a prominent man is attacked in print and newspapers figure the man attacked certainly deserves the right to answer.

Another item in Terry's piece that irritates New York sports writers is his story of the chastisement of Clyde Costleman, the pitcher. Terry says he knew the only way to break Costleman's lazy ways was to make him pitch a full game, come what may, and he wrote because baseball writers with the club criticized him for making Costleman "take it" for nine blistering innings that hot day in Cincinnati. Yet, the truth of it is the writers asked Terry for an explanation of the strange procedure and he told them to "get the hell out of my way."

Terry long contended newspapermen who travelled with the team at the club's expense, were chiselers but he changed his tune when a certain newspaper offered to pay its writer's way if the Giants paid for all the advertising they get daily in the newspaper involved.

Two Moncton Players Are Ruled Ineligible By M. A. H. A. President

ST. JOHN, N. B., Jan. 26—(CP)—Charles Phillips, rearward of the Moncton Maroons in the Southern New Brunswick Hockey League, and Eddie Powers his right wing team-mate were ruled ineligible today by Hanson T. Dowell of Middleton, N. S., president of the Maritime Amateur Hockey Association.

At the same time Dowell ruled that the St. Stephen team was suspended because officials of the club allegedly did not reimburse the Saint John Pontiacs for a junior playoff game last season with the St. Croix juniors.

The latter ruling was set over, however, when the Maritime president was informed that a letter containing details that the matter had been ironed out to the satisfaction of the Saint John junior team, was in the Dowell file.

Phillips and Powers did not take the ice at Fredericton tonight for the game with the Moncton Maroons.

Dowell stated that until such time as the Moncton club officials have furnished affidavits that Phillips and Powers had worked for the same concern six months prior to being transferred to Moncton both players would be barred from playing with the Moncton team.

Phillips and Powers were obtained from Toronto via the business transfer route, it is understood, but their eligibility was questioned by William A. Hewitt, secretary of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association, who ruled that both were ineligible and could not compete for any Maritime team.

Dowell also said that Herb Gillis, coach of the Saint John Beavers, would not be allowed to play in any further games in the Southern New Brunswick Hockey League or play in New Brunswick or the Maritimes.

"Dud" James, coach of the Moncton players, said at Fredericton tonight he had received word from Manager Henry Watts in Moncton that the Beavers or Powers. He said he believed they would be reinstated by Friday.
