MR. JOSEPH R. GARLAND
Auburn

The death of Mr. Joseph R. Garland, Auburn, occurred at his home on Tuesday morning, April 14th. Early in the season he contracted a slight cold. This finally developed into pneumonia, with other complications, and he passed away very unexpectedly, despite skillful medical treatment and the careful attention of loving and devoted friends.
The deceased was a son of Mr. Joseph Garland and the late Mrs. Garland, Fort Augustus. He was in his 41st year. Going to Lowell, Mass., when quite a young man, he entered the employ of one of the largest machine shops in the city. He became a moulder by trade, and was a splendid mechanic. Upon the entrance of the United States into the Great War he was sent to Camp McLellan, Alabama, in order to train for active service. His unit was ready for overseas when the Armistice was signed. He then received an honourable discharge, and a Certificate in this effect from his commanding officer, testifying to his excellent conduct, and to his unblemished character, was one of his most cherished possessions.
The late Mr. Garland was of a retiring disposition; but he was very highly esteemed and respected by those with whom he was most intimately associated. Intelligent, and well read, he was a very interesting companion; and he had a fund of anecdotes and general information which he had gathered through extensive travel as well as from reading and observation. Deeply religious, he had the great privilege of a happy death, receiving the last Rites of the Church from the hands of his pastor, the Rev. Dr. Croken. Notwithstanding the almost impassable condition of the roads, the funeral on Thursday morning was well attended. A High Mass of Requiem was sung by the Rev. Dr. Croken. The pall bearers were Messrs. Damien Lynn, Joseph Simpson, Hugh Hayes, Edward Shea, John J. Barrett, and Ernest Quinn. Numerous Mass Cards and letters of sympathy were received.
Besides his aged father, five brothers and three sisters are left to mourn: Peter, and Leo on the home-stead, John at Auburn, Thomas in Manchester, N. H., Arthur in Dorchester, Mass.; Mrs. Foster in Lowell, Mrs. Griffin in Dorchester and Mrs. McCarron at Auburn.
The Guardian extends sincere sympathy to the family members and other relatives in their bereavement and loss. May his soul rest in peace.
