



ON HIS WAY TO ENGLAND.—The Right Rev. Monsignor Burke, who has been appointed Superintendent of Catholic Chaplains to the overseas forces with the rank of major, left New York a few days ago on his way to England.

MRS. DUNBRACK RESIGNS.—The Guardian understands that Mrs. Dunbrack, who has done such excellent work in connection with the Women's Institutes in this Province, has resigned her position, much to the regret of a wide circle of friends.

EARNSCLIFFE NOTES.—Mrs. Isabella Doyle entertained a number of her friends at her home Monday evening, and every one present spent a most enjoyable time, for Mrs. Doyle is one of the finest and kindest women in this little island and her son, Bernard, one of the very best boys. RICHMOND STREET FIRE.—A slight fire started yesterday morning on the premises of Mr. Archibald Irwin, King's Printer, at the foot of Richmond Street. The origin of the fire is unknown. Mr. McInnis, a member of the brigade, who lives next door, gave the alarm and the firemen were speedily on the spot. The fire started in the roof, so after cutting a hole through they succeeded in putting the flames out within half an hour. Very little damage was done. Especially worthy of note is the fact that the firemen refrained from deluging the place and succeeded in putting out the blaze with the minimum supply of water. Mr. Irwin's stock and plant are of an up-to-date and valuable description and considerable damage might have been done had the water penetrated into the office.

BEAUTIFUL "BRIGHTON" BOOMING.—The residents of Brighton are grateful to the City Council for permanent improvements in the laying of water and sewer drains, sidewalks, increased light and heat of all the concrete work at Government Pond. The next work of art will be that Pond, and any improvements along that line will have the financial support and co-operation of the citizens of this flourishing suburb. Houses and lots are in demand in Brighton but those living there are not anxious to sell for the most part. Mr. Archibald Irwin, King's Printer, has just now, Mr. Russell White has commenced the foundation for a house, on one of the three lots bought from Mr. Weeks, facing on Villa Street next to Mr. William Prowse's lovely house. Mr. Harry Tidmarsh's magnificent residence adds greatly to the natural beauty of his property and will be completed this fall. Mr. Ivan Reddin's artistic houses are nearing completion and no more beautiful surroundings could be desired facing Victoria Park, and close to boating and bathing facilities. Mr. W. A. McEachern has recently moved into his comfortable new house, Ambrose street, Dr. Fullerton's home (St. James' Mass) has undergone great improvements internally and externally during the summer months and, when shortly completed will add attraction to a naturally beautiful corner, nestled between trees of many years standing. Mr. J. J. McKinnon's new home, Brighton Road not only fills in a space that seemed lost before the concrete work for water was completed, but really leaves nothing to be desired for the entrance of Brighton suburbs. The house is artistic in architecture, and home like in appearance and will be completed this fall. In the immediate vicinity Mr. Parkman has completed two moderate sized houses now occupied, and another one is under construction. Mr. Peter McDonald's new residence, which completes a lovely line of well kept lawns and comfortable homes on Rochford Street, is expected to be occupied this autumn. The new acadmised Road now about completed will add greatly to the boulevard appearance of the street. There are about twenty-five houses building in Charlottetown, the suburb of Brighton is not at all behind in the percentage of new residents and homes. There are rumors that a Boating and Bathing Club House will be erected in the vicinity of Light house, North River next spring which would add much to these pleasures right within reach of Brighton Residents.
