ST. Suspended Lodges Claim the Grand Secretary Has No Power

GLACE BAY, May 13.—The lodges of the P. W. A., Ironides, Aberdeen and Keystone at North Aberdeen, whose charters were revoked by order of the Grand Secretary on Saturday night last, have appointed a committee who will receive legal advice. It is claimed by the lodges that a charter can only be revoked by authority of the sub-council, which they claim the Grand Secretary did not have. Again, they claim that if the charter of the Aberdeen lodge is revoked Grand Outside Watch Nicholson, who is a member of that lodge, is no longer a grand officer. The lodges have retained a local solicitor to look after this interest and expert legal opinion will be secured from Halifax on the matter of revocation of charters. The situation in labor circles here is becoming most interesting.


