THUNDER STORM.—A heavy thunder and lightning storm accompanied by a heavy downpour of rain passed over Summerside and western part of Prince County early Saturday morning. The storm being particularly heavy around Miscouche where the barns of David and Henry Lecky, situated about 200 yards apart were both struck, the barn of the former was struck on the gable end and a row of shingles stripped off to the ground. The owner's son, a boy of about 16, who was in the barn at the time was badly stunned. The barn of Henry Lecky was damaged more than the other one, the whole gable end as well as a part of the side of it being badly damaged.—I.

Buchanan, Summerside, Mrs. Wilfred Inman, Tryon, and Mrs. Howard Weeks, Fredericton, P. E. I. The funeral takes place this, (Tuesday) afternoon at 2.30 from her residence to the People's Cemetery.—S.

SITTING ON CHAIRS CAUSE OF INJURIES

Chairs was the subject of a lecture by Dr. E. H. Bradford at the Harvard Medical School recently. It would be better for the people if they sat on the floor, he said, because chairs do not give proper support and rest.

"The early man," said Dr. Bradford, "was so constructed that he needed no chair. The chair was invented first for rulers and then for workers. Its use as a luxury is of comparatively recent origin, and no chair can be devised in which the sitter can be comfortable if he sits too long. The chair is a luxury that, misused, may cause great harm. There is something to be learned from the Oriental in this regard. To recline on a divan is much better than to twist the body in a stuffed chair. The primitive man and the savage did not need a chair as nature provided him with a suitable mechanism for sitting and resting his legs. The hunter, trapper and soldier when tired rested on the ground. The handicrafts man and his help use a stool. His back muscles are strengthened by his work and he needs the support of a chair back but little.

THE WATER SUPPLY OF FOUR CITIES POLLUTED.

ST. CATHERINES, July 17.—Representatives of St. Catherines, Welland, Thorold and Merriton today interviewed Hon.
