Ottawa Men Lose Heavily In Stock Slump

(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, March 4.—The Journal says: One Ottawa man is reported to be lying at death's door as the result of losing \$14,000 on the stock market yesterday and another prominent resident of the capital is reported to be down \$30,000 while hundreds of others are said to have lost heavily when Wall Street stocks started tumbling being quickly followed by a sympathetic Canadian market.

To Establish Air Service To South America

(Canadian Press) MADRID, March 4.—The Spanish government has decided to construct an air port for accommodation of a line of dirigible airships to fly between Seville and Buenos Aires. The cost of the project is estimated about \$5,900,000.

Stock Movement Checked

(Special to the Guardian) NEW YORK, March 4.—The reactionary movement in stock prices which has continued uninterrupted for over a week and has reduced the quoted value of securities by over \$1,000,000,000 was checked at least temporarily today when strong banking support was provided for a long list of high grade railroad and industrial shares.

(Canadian Press) HALIFAX, N. S., March 4.—A wireless message from the steamship Volendam received here at noon today stated that the schooner General Smuts had been abandoned and set afire in latitude 44.16 north, longitude 58.27 west.

Navy Personnel Will Not Be Reduced

(Canadian Press) LONDON, March 4.—Rt. Hon. W. C. Bridgeman, first lord of the admiralty stated in the House of Commons today that the personnel of the Royal Navy will not be reduced this year but will be maintained at the same numerical status as in 1925.

Must Obtain Seat Or Lose Office

(Canadian Press) WARSAW, March 4.—Open threat was made in the Senate yesterday by the Opposition that should Count Skrzynski, Polish Premier and Foreign Minister return from Geneva without having obtained a seat in the League of Nations Council for Poland he will be turned out of office.

SAYS GERMANY MUST NOT BE OBSTRUCTED

(Canadian Press) LONDON, March 4.—Speaking warily and admitting the delicacy of the occasion, Sir Austen Chamberlain, Foreign Secretary, told the House this afternoon that Britain would not oppose unanimous agreement of other members of the League of Nations Council to award a permanent seat to some nation besides Germany.
