Snead Edges Gray By Two Strokes To Retain Canadian Open Title

TORONTO, Aug. 10 (CP)—Samuel Jackson Snead of Shawnee-On-Delaware, who is emotionally equipped to play his best when the pressure upon him is strongest, won the Canadian Open Golf Championship over the sun-baked suburban Lambton Course Saturday.

Snead shot a one-under-par 69 on the final round and pulled away to a two-stroke victory over Bobby Gray, Jr., the handsome Toronto professional who held him even at conclusion of the first 54 holes.

Snead's final gave him a 72-hole total of 274, six under par for the four full rounds. It also gave him his third Canadian title in four years and his second in a row. It also won him \$1,000 to him.

Gray collected \$600 for running second to Snead and another \$200 and the Rivermead Cup for leading the Canadian professionals. Sarazen's third-place money was \$400.

Yanks clamp Double defeat On Athletics

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 10 (AP)—New York Yankees made it three in a row over the failing Athletics today by sweeping a doubleheader 11-2 and 4-1 before 35,500 fans.

The second largest crowd of the season here saw the American League leaders batter Jack Knott with a 16-hit barrage in the opener. A five-run first inning assured the Yankee victory.

At Detroit, St. Louis Browns backed Bob Munierief with enough power in their bats to stay in front all the way and defeat Tigers 7-3 to split a two-game series.

In winning his seventh game this season, the St. Louis righthander scattered 10 hits and neither walked nor whiffed a batter.

White Sox scored two in the tenth to take Indians to camp. Senators blasted Lefty Grove out of the box in the eighth inning and then moved along to hang up an 8-6 win over the third place Red Sox.

Dodgers and Cardinals win Double victories

BROOKLYN, Aug. 10 (AP)—Brooklyn Dodgers cashed in on their power and the gulle of Freddy Fitzsimmons today to retain their hold on the top rung in the humpy-dumpy National League pennant race as they knocked down Boston Braves in both ends of a doubleheader, 14-4 and 4-0, before a happy crowd of 29,445.

Pounding three Boston pitchers for 17 hits in the first game, the Dodgers won going away behind the 13-hit hurling of Luke Hamlin, who hung up his seventh victory of the season.

The Dodgers included in their barrage four doubles and Joe Medwick's 14th homer of the year in a tumultuous battle which saw police twice intervene to prevent what approached a riot between the two teams.

In the fifth inning Dick Erickson, second Brave pitcher, clipped Medwick on the right elbow with a pitched ball and then struck Dolph Camilli, the next batter, on the back of the head. Quick action by the umpires and police averted trouble.

At St. Louis, the Cardinals kept pace with the victorious Brooklyn Dodgers in the hot race, subduing Pittsburgh Pirates 3-2 and 4-2. Soulfjaw Ernie White won his 14th victory in the opener and Mort Cooper his 10th in the second.

At New York, winding up a three-game series in which each game was decided by one run, the Giants and last-place Phillies broke even in a doubleheader before a small Sunday crowd of 9,877.

In the opener young Tommy Hughes pitched good ball for seven innings and the Phils, with Bob Bragan hitting a homer, worked up a 4-1 lead at that point. But in the eighth pinch-hitter Gabby Hartnett and Harry Danning hit homers, each with a man on base, to give the Giants a 5-4 victory.

At Chicago, Cincinnati Reds spoiled the business end of "Charley Root day" by defeating Cubs and their veteran pitcher 3-1 to sweep the two-game series. It was the Cubs' ninth defeat in 11 starts.

Before the game the 42-year-old Root received a station wagon purchased with dimes contributed by fans, a cheque for \$1,600 from the Cubs and other items, including a baby pig.

Everything In Readiness For Opening Of Old Home Week; Horse Racing Program

With stables filled to capacity with the finest horses in the Maritimes and old acquaintances being renewed by the score the Exhibition race track Saturday afternoon was the busiest place in town as horsemen and horse followers gathered in separate groups discussing the coming big meet which opens on Tuesday afternoon and winds up on Friday.

And it is the consensus of opinion that this year's meet will be on a par if not better than any ever held before. All classes have filled to capacity and they are such that racing fans can expect some of the keenest and sensational racing ever witnessed over the "twice-around".

Showing they were right at the peak of their condition some of the horses were sent fast miles on Saturday, notably All Grattan, who slept the last eighth of a mile in 19 seconds and looked to be well within himself in so doing. Charlotte B, after a poor showing in other races this season surprised the railbirds as she went a mile in 2:12 with the last half in 1:05. This fast mare should be right at her peak when she faces the starter's bell and will bear plenty of watching.

The above was only a couple of miles that the writer was able to get in on the time but all day long the different horses were reeling off fast miles that betokened some very fast racing from Tuesday till Friday. Watches were being snapped all day long and many were the surprised comments heard after the time had been checked.
