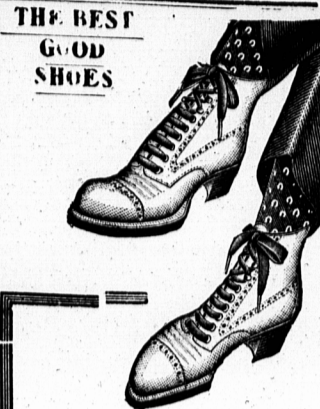
On Wednesday evening, March 22nd, a very pleasant event took place at the Baptist Parsonage, North River, by the Rev. E. P. Calder, when Miss Sadie McQuarrie of Long Creek was united in marriage to Colin R. McPhail of St. Catherine's. The bride was assisted by Miss Lena McPhail sister of the groom, while Heber McLean, Duncedin, supported the groom.
The recent sale of the stock, crop and implements of Duncan Hyde Cornwall, was very largely attended and was pronounced one of the most successful in that section of the country. Cattle brought as high as \$75, while horses were sold for figures as high as \$250. Everything was sold. F. H. Horne, city, was the auctioneer. Another sale took place Saturday last. The farm was previously sold to John McLaughlin, Clyde River.

The Ministerial Oversight Committee of the New Brunswick Conference are enquiring into certain charges against the Rev. W. R. Robinson, of the St. John Baptist Church, a pastor well known in this city. An exchange, in reporting the case says:—"The charge brought by Captain Crossley against Mr. Robinson is slandering his daughters and illegally having them turned out of the church. It is said that the proceedings yesterday were of a formal nature and preparatory to getting the case before the meeting of the association in July. Some time ago a council of the denomination met, and after hearing all the evidence in the Crossley matter, granted the girls letters to join any other church. Up to the present, however, the Misses Crossley, it is said, have not attempted to use these letters. The charge brought by Mrs. Maxwell is said to be of a far more serious nature, and has been reduced to writing and sworn to." The case will be taken up by the executive of the Conference in about three weeks time.

There passed peacefully into rest on the 21st March at Cans Cove after a long illness, Alexander McLean, Elder, at the age of 64 years. Deceased had been a sufferer for many years with rheumatism besides being afflicted in many other ways, yet he bore it patiently and by Divine grace was enabled to look forward with hope to that rest that remains for the people of God. He could truly say that for him to live was Christ and to die was pain. He leaves to mourn a devoted wife who tenderly cared for him during the many weary days and nights of his sickness; also eight sons and two daughters, one son and two daughters having preceded him. His funeral which took place on Tuesday the 23rd, was largely attended although the day was a very stormy one. The services were conducted by the Rev. Daniel McLean, who so kindly visited him on many occasions during his sickness. The pall bearers were Ewen McFadyen, Roderick McRae, Colin McDougall, Dugald McDougall, Lancelot McKinnon, and Neil McKenzie.

The improved grading of the city streets as compared with the grading of some few years ago has been commended quite frequently of late. The capacity of the gutters has been taxed recently in carrying off the water arising from the melting snow and in but few cases has the grading condition of the gutter been such as to prevent the proper exit for the flowing of water. The streets are drying up remarkably fast as a consequence; and even in the low quarters of the city the drying up process in making rapid headway. In the vicinity of the Railway Station things in this respect are a decided improvement over last year. The Cumberland Street of one year ago was soft mud and was almost impassable at the time when the spring thaws were wreaking havoc with the winter's deposit of snow. The other principal approach to the Railway Station, Water Street, was in almost a similar, though slightly better, condition. This year Cumberland street is quite dry in the centre, although the work of the city officials has not yet been completed, and Water Street as a result of material beneficial repairs effected in 1910, is in a splendid condition for this season of the year. Of course there are some bad spots throughout the city thoroughfares but the principle of the city workmen in effecting repairs to the most used streets first, while temporarily it neglects some side streets, meets with the approval of almost every citizen.

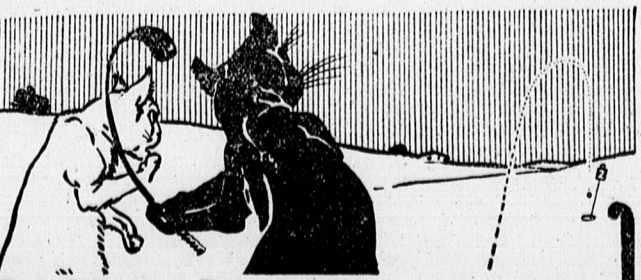
