One Of The World's Greatest Cows

C. L. Goodhue, manager of Raymond Farm, Vaudreuil, Quebec, reports the death, early in August, of their wonderful cow, Countess of North America, champion producer of milk, weighing 1,101 lbs. fat and 30,443 lbs. milk to her credit. She was also one of the outstanding show cows of the breed, being selected as reserve All-American aged cow in 1925. She was grand champion at the Canadian National Exhibition, Central Canada Exhibition, and elsewhere last year, and won first in the milk class at the Canadian Royal, but was beaten out of grand championship because of her poor condition following a hard time at calving. This year she started out with the grand championship at the Ormstown show in June, and being bred to show just at the time of the National Dairy Show was looked upon as the outstanding candidate for National grand championship and All-American honors in 1926. We are not advised of the cause of her death, but Manager Goodhue wrote us shortly after returning from Ormstown that they had had trouble with her and would not be able to show her before the Royal in November at least. Her death is not only a loss to Raymond Farm, but to the entire breed. Countess Abekerk Henke was a daughter of Count Paul Posch, and probably the outstanding female representative of this great family. She leaves at Raymond Farm a beautiful yearling heifer that gives promise of being heard from as she develops further.—(Holstein-Friesian World.)

Bunbury Farm developed the above cow and sold her for \$2500 last year. There is a daughter of this cow and a 3 year old son now heading Bunbury herd. Edgar Milligan also has another son of her.

So great a judge as Editor Prescott has said that she was the best showing cow in America as she was also the best producer.
