If the Russians collapse or if the Germans succeed in establishing a strong defensive line, Germany would make a peace offer to Britain and the United States. Should peace be rejected and the middle east offensive fail, Germany might attempt an invasion of Britain.

Meanwhile, pressure would be exerted on France, Spain and Portugal for German occupation of Dakar and the Azores to unify the continent against Britain.

The military sources reported that the slow advance of the German army had caused "visible disappointment" among the German population, who were more interested in the prospect of rapid occupation of the Ukraine than in the capture of Smolensk or Leningrad.

Ukraine foods are expected to supplement German stores, but if the Ukraine is not occupied this month civilian rations will be reduced," the sources said.

The 5th division. Since then an armored division has been formed and named the 5th Canadian (armored) division. Artillery, engineer, signal and army service corps units for the 6th division will be mobilized from reserve army units across Canada.

The announcement makes the setup of the Canadian army as follows:

Two divisions (1st and 2nd) fully trained and ready for action overseas as part of the Canadian Corps.

The 3rd division largely overseas but not quite complete and starting final training.

The 4th division mobilized, completely organized and in an advanced stage of training in Canada; The armored division training in Canada, destined for movement overseas this year.

The 6th division now mobilizing for training in Canada to disclose plans for concentrating either the 4th or 6th divisions with Canada but said for the time being it was likely the 6th division would be concentrated in brigade groups at different points as defence needs and training facilities dictated.

Each brigade group will consist of an infantry brigade of three battalions and a full complement of units from other arms. Some of the infantry units for the sixth are on garrison duty in various parts of the country and will be relieved as men called up for compulsory training and retained in the army for service in Canada are detailed to take over these duties.

While the minister gave no suggestion of any additional concentration of troops on the Pacific coast because of the Oriental situation he said, "we are taking all the precautions considered necessary there."

lost more than 30 transports, 10 destroyers, three patrol boats, two monitors, two cutters and two trawlers. It pointed out that the Germans had been unable to transfer large warships into the Baltic.

A dispatch from the front reported that sailors from the Baltic fleet had recaptured a village after a three-day battle in their first land encounter with the Germans.

Facing superior numbers, the sailors were reported to have taken the village with a bayonet charge after an artillery duel.

Today's Russian communique reported that battles raged throughout the night in the directions of Kaksaimi, Smolensk, Bel Tserkov and in Estonia. Kaksaimi is on the Karelian Isthmus about 75 miles northwest of Leningrad. Smolensk is before Moscow and Bel Tserkov is south of Kiev.

All these places have been reported as battle regions before, and the high command said there was no large scale action elsewhere.

**Probe sabotage Possibility in Tanker blast**

DETROIT, Aug. 8 —(AP) — The federal bureau of investigation opened an inquiry to determine if sabotage caused the 190-foot Canadian tanker Transier to explode and burn with 15,000 barrels of high-test gasoline aboard tonight in the Rouge River. Two of the 17 Canadians aboard were missing.

F. B. I. agent John S. Bugas said: "We're investigating this explosion just as we investigate all such incidents of that nature. We can not comment further now."

Detroit police reported two persons apparently lost their lives and that 15 others jumped overboard and were rescued. Eight of them were injured.

The missing were Mrs. Alicia Tremblay, Quebec, wife of Captain Rudolph Tremblay, who was rescued, and Robert Frechette, Montreal, a member of the crew.

One crew member said he saw the Captain's wife sink beside the flaming ship.

The ship arrived here last night and loaded the gasoline at the docks of the Joy Oil Company. The vessel is owned by Transit Tankers and Terminals, Limited, Montreal. The all-steel Diesel-powered carrier was built in 1938.

Capt. Tremblay told police he could advance no reason for tonight's blast.

Bernard Couture, member of the crew, said: "It was just after dinner when it exploded. I was standing in the middle of the ship. All of a sudden there was an explosion and a big flame in the middle of the ship."

Then things happened so fast none of us knew what was going on."

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### Red warplanes Bomb Berlin

LONDON, Aug. 8 —(AP) — Russian warplanes dropped explosive and incendiary bombs in the Berlin area Thursday night in the first Soviet raid on the German capital, the Moscow radio reported tonight.

The Soviet report described the raid as a reconnaissance flight undertaken by a group of planes, the size of which was not stated. A number of fires were declared to have been started, after which all the Russian planes returned to their bases safely.

slans can reach it from the lower Dnieper for a new stand.

The Nazis say they have captured an army commander and 30,000 men in the Uman region. This would mean a serious break at that point to Hitler's vast offensive is being retreat which the Red armies in the southern Ukraine will have to attempt if the Uman and Byelaya Tserkov flanking operations cannot be checked.

While the thrust to Byelaya Tserkov seems to have made no definite progress since that junction was reached, the stab to Uman, 75 miles south and west of Byelaya Tserkov, is a far greater immediate menace to the Russians.

It now appears unquestionable that the whole force of Hitler's new offensive is being concentrated southward from the break-through toward Kiev, virtually by-passing Kiev itself.

There seems no reasonable foundation for the Berlin assertion that Kiev has been "encircled". That could not be true unless the Germans have fought their way across the Dnieper both north and south of the city and crossing the Dnieper in the Kiev area would mean major battles.
