COUNTY COURT—At the County Court of Prince County on Monday morning, Judge Inman delivered judgment in the case of John D. McIver vs. Parnell Murphy, John L. Murphy and Emmet Murphy, action for \$250 damages for assault which occurred at Emerald Hall on the night of Nov. 27th last. This assault had occurred in Queens County and the parties lived in Prince County. The defence counsel raised the question of jurisdiction of the Prince County Court to try a case arising in Queens County. The Judge held that the cause of action followed the plaintiff who resided in Prince County and the Court in Prince County therefore had jurisdiction to try the case. On the merits of the case as to Parnell Murphy the Judge decided there was no case made out against him and he gave him judgment of non suit and costs of his witnesses. The Judge struck John L. Murphy from the record as it had not been proved, he said, that any damage had been caused by him to the plaintiff. He found that Emmet Murphy had committed an assault on the plaintiff for which he allowed plaintiff \$10 damages and costs but the costs of his witnesses to be set off against Parnell Murphy's witness fees. The Judge stated he would have allowed the plaintiff more substantial damages but for the fact that he went into the affair with his eyes open as to what was going on and he could have kept away from Emmet Murphy's altogether. Bad Fire At Wilmot

Shortly before ten o'clock on Monday morning the large residence of Mr. Henry Crozier at Wilmot Valley caught fire through the explosion of a gasoline engine in the washroom and in a short time the house was reduced to ashes. Mr. Crozier was away from home at the time driving the school children of the district into Summerside as is his custom.

His wife alone in the house was doing the family washing in an out kitchen attached to the main part of the house, with the aid of a gasoline engine. Mrs. Crozier, it is supposed, attempted to fill the tank while the engine was running and it exploded burning her very badly about the face, arms and hands. The house was quickly in flames. Neighbors rushed to the spot and took Mrs. Crozier to Mrs. Robert Waugh's house near by. It was with difficulty that any of the furniture was saved as the flames spread so quickly but after strenuous efforts a few things were taken from the burning building. Only the out buildings and Mrs. Waugh's house were saved, and this was due to the efforts of the neighbours, who piled snow upon them and also to the fact that the day was calm with no wind. Mr. Crozier's residence, which was one of the finest in the district, was only partly covered by insurance. A pile of wood in the out kitchen was still burning at noon although the house itself was entirely burned out with nothing but the chimneys standing.

Mrs. Crozier was taken to the Prince County Hospital, where she is resting as comfortably as can be expected. Much sympathy is expressed for Mr. and Mrs. Crozier in their loss. S.

THE MARKETS (Canadian Press)

MONTREAL, Que., Jan. 5.—Egg prices were lower and cheese gained one cent, while butter and potatoes were unchanged on the produce and dairy market here today. Ontario fresh extras in carlots were two cents lower at 38 cents a dozen, while firsts, pullets and seconds were unchanged at 32 cents, 30 cents and 28 cents a dozen. British Columbia fresh firsts declined one cent at 34 cents a dozen and extras at 40 cents and seconds at 30 cents, remained unchanged. Quotations to retailers were from one to three cents lower. Fresh specials, extras and firsts all lost two cents at 48 to 50 cents, 45 to 47 cents and 40 to 42 cents a dozen respectively. Fresh pullet extras were off three cents at 34 to 36 cents and fresh seconds dropped two cents at 31 to 33 cents a dozen. Storage extras, firsts and seconds declined one cent a dozen at 25 to 27 cents, 31 to 33 cents and 27 to 29 cents a dozen. Receipts were 1,049 cases. Ontario cheese advanced one cent at
