Treat Your Seed Potatoes

Now that the great success of the seed potato industry in 1927 is history, the country is settling down to consider seriously the problem of producing a crop in 1928 which will maintain the high standard for which the "Garden of the Gulf Brand" is famous.

- 1. Dissolve all bi-chloride in boiling hot water.
2. When 12 to 16 bushels of potatoes have been treated make up a new solution.
3. Do not treat in bags.
4. If possible use rain water, or water known to be soft.
5. After treating put seed in a clean place to dry quickly.
6. If weather does not permit rapid drying wash the tubers off with water immediately after treatment.
7. Caution: Treated potatoes are poisonous and must not be fed to stock.
8. TREAT YOUR SEED POTATOES AND FURTHER PROTECT THE INDUSTRY WHICH MEANS SO MUCH TO OUR PROVINCE.

The death occurred in East Royal on Friday afternoon, April 27th, of Mr. William Connolly, aged 83, a well known and highly respected farmer. Mr. Connolly was an expert road maker and had been employed under various governments. He leaves to mourn a widow, three sons, John in Fort William, Ont., Ernest in Boston, Bruce in Paris, Texas, and three daughters, Mrs. T. M. AUSTRALIA'S NEW NAVY ON ADMIRALTY POLICY

Big Five-Year Programme Being Carried Out By Commonwealth Government.

LONDON, April 29.—Australian naval history is given at some length by a special correspondent of the London Morning Post, who comments on the flagship of the Australian fleet, the Melbourne, arriving at Portsmouth recently to be put out of commission by the ship-breakers and succeeded by the new flagship of Rear-Admiral Hyde, the first Australian admiral of the Australian fleet. The Australia and her sister ship, the Canberra, are expected to be completed and sailed from Plymouth some time in July.

The Australian Federal Government in 1924 decided, following Admiralty policy, that the best course in the interest of economical provision for all defence arms was the adoption of 5-year programmes. In addition to the annual votes since then it appropriated in 1924 from surplus revenue £2,500,000—£2,000,000 for new naval construction and £500,000 as a general defence reserve.

MCKENNA MAKES BIG HIT WITH FAMOUS SPORT WRITER

His Sensational Twisting Right Cross Is Being Heralded By Prominent Sport Writers In Chicago And Cleveland.—They Have Named His Punch The "Harpoon."

Earle Ferris, prominent sports editor writing in a Cleveland "Examiner," has this to say about Jack McKenna: "By Earle Ferris Jack McKenna, 'The Halifax Harpooner,' who leaves here shortly for a tour of the Maritime Provinces, before starting his American out-door boxing season, and who is scheduled to meet one of New York's craziest boxers, Jimmy Cox, in the Frigate Edward Island sometime in May, is one of the most colorful characters in the ring today."

The son of a Nova Scotia fishing captain, graduated as an undertaker, he is today holder of both the welterweight and middleweight titles in Canada, and is the possessor of a famous twisting right cross, which sports writers in America have dubbed his "harpoon." Born in Pictou, Nova Scotia, the son of Captain John McKenna, a 200-pound skipper of the fishing boat Belle Prince, young McKenna, sailed the seas during his school vacations and got himself a tough back and strong set of muscles while hauling in fishing nets. When he was still in high school his friend, Charles X. McDonald, dared him to enter an amateur boxing tournament at North Sidney, N. S., as a welterweight, which he did. In four fights he won the amateur welterweight championship of the Maritime Provinces. He later won the Canadian welterweight amateur title by beating Cliff Graham in Toronto in four rounds.

In 1926 he turned pro, meeting Nedder Healey, Eastern Canada champion, at Halifax, N. S., where he won the decision. Shortly after this he placed himself under the guidance of Eddie Mead, the man who developed Joe Lynch to be one of the world's greatest champions.
