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Monthly Meeting Of Town Council

The regular monthly meeting of the Summerside Town Council was held last evening with His Worship Mayor J. F. Arnett presiding and only Councilor Morrill, Morrison and Mollison present.

A petition was read from the restaurant operators asking that the recently imposed licence fee of \$50.00 be reduced to the original licence of \$10.00 restored.

The Council stated that according to official statistics the cost of foodstuffs are up 52 per cent and that restaurant prices remain the same. It pointed out that as far as is known, other towns of comparative size do not levy such a high licence. Mayor Arnett charged \$10.00 and Moncton \$5.00.

Councilor Mollison said that the proposed licence is not fair and reasonable to him. He said that with one exception no restaurant pay taxes over \$25.00 which is less than a small grocery store would pay. He moved and Councilor Morrison seconded that the petition not be granted. The motion carried unanimously.

The clerk read a petition from three taxi operators: Heustis, Taxi, Town Taxi, and Roy's Taxi, requesting that the limit of the number of cars allowed be raised from 12 to 15. Councilor Morrison felt that the request should be granted. He said that the citizens are becoming more taxi conscious and that the present limit is quite busy. One operator told him, he stated, that one day 32 cabs were in town and it seems unfair that one taxi stand should have four cars and others have only one. He moved and Councilor Morrison seconded that the number of taxis permitted to operate be increased and that licences be granted at the discretion of the town council.

Mayor Arnett said he had given instructions to the police to check on all speeders. He agreed that there was too much of it. The motion was carried unanimously.

A petition was read from 29 property owners on Duke Street requesting that the street be paved as soon as possible. They asked that other streets be started immediately and stated that they agreed to give whatever aid was possible.

The clerk stated that only three property owners on the street had not signed the petition.

Councilor Morrill said it was the intention to commence the work next week. He expressed the opinion that those who have not signed were making a mistake as it would improve their property and increase its value.

Further reporting for the street committee Councilor Morrill said that the work was completed by laying the new sidewalk and increasing the width of the street.

Some correspondence was read with regard to efforts being made to obtain a four-wheel drive truck from War Assets Corporation. The matter is still being investigated.

Mayor Arnett reported that a night watchman had been hired for the town hall and would be on duty all night to answer police calls and give out information.

Councilor Mollison stated that it was a long while since there had been a milk inspection and he thought there should be one right away. The Mayor gave instructions that this be done.

compare favourably with that spent on public works. It is all too common to see expensive paved highways passing in a small shabby school house run by an over-worked and poorly-paid teacher. The contrast is lamentable. Material things should not be permitted to obscure the development of individual citizens. A nation's greatest asset is good citizenship, and a government that will develop its economic and political resources and not in least the efficiency of the educational system is putting the cart before the horse. In other words, one cannot build a durable house without considering the quality of its foundations and of the bricks of which it is composed.

Two Problems - Now we have two problems side by side. They can be settled, but it seems that a fundamental change of outlook is the primary prerequisite for their solution. It is clear, too, that our Dominion-wide problem should be regarded in the light of the world issue in comparison with which it is relatively small. For our local troubles are not now our biggest ones. These two problems are tremendous in their scope and significance. Many developments, both theoretical and practical, will be necessary in order to find a way to improvement. The emphasis of educational facilities is one of the most important and practical of these developments. And it is one in which every province and every locality can bear a share.

The answer then, to the question of where we stand in relation to these issues comes in the form of two other questions: "What can we do to enlarge the outlook of ourselves and of our community?"
