U.S. Pair Capture Three Can. Titles

OTTAWA, July 28—The tennis-playing Lewises of Huntsville, Alabama—Morey and Baba—today have four more trophies to add to a growing collection following their nearly complete sweep of the men's doubles crown alone was salvaged from their assault by the rampaging Macken brothers, Brendan and Jimmy.

Morey, 28-year-old sandy-haired former California champion, won his second Canadian men's singles crown and teamed with his vivacious little wife to capture the mixed doubles. Then he ran out the string, to take the match 2-6, 6-4, 6-4 and win the coveted Melroir Cup.

His dark, petite wife, formerly ranked eighth in California, had much less difficulty with hard-hitting Miss Haney.

In a mixing men's doubles set, Lewis teamed with a veteran Ottawa competitor, Edgar Murphy, against the Macken boys who had just won the mixed doubles at Williamsburg, Virginia. Staring slowly, the Mackens dropped the first set 6-4, but in the next three sets took command at net to send crashing back about everything Lewis and Murphy could throw at them and win the Garnett-Melroir trophy by scores of 3-6, 6-1, 6-4, 7-5.

The women's doubles was practically a no-contest. Mrs. Lewis and Miss Haney had far too much power for the Montreal team of Helen and Doris. The latter hit the first turn and made a one-horse race of it all the way. The Duke's team purchased only a year ago as a selling plate for \$4,000, is owned by Mrs. A. G.
