MONTREAL MAROONS CAPTURE STANLEY CUP

Defeat Toronto Maple Leafs In Third Game 4-1

Marvin Wentworth Hero Of Series As Maroons Display Plenty Of Class In Taking Highly Rated Leafs.

MONTREAL, April 9—The Stanley Cup returned to Montreal tonight on the crest of a 4-1 victory by Montreal Maroons in a fighting, brainy display of hockey that turned back Toronto Maple Leafs for the third successive game.

Marvin Wentworth was hailed as the hero of the series and Manager Tommy Gorman as one of the great ice managers of all time as Maroons swept through the powerful Toronto squad in three straight games of a three of five series.

Wentworth scored a goal and an assist while performing heroically on the defence. Jimmy Ward and "Baldy" Northcott shared the honors not only holding the Toronto bombers, Charlie Conacher and Buster Jackson scoreless but scoring a goal each. Northcott had two assists and Ward one. Gus Marker got the other. Thirteen thousand saw the game.

Only once before had the Stanley Cup been settled in three straight games, the Leafs themselves accomplishing that feat in 1932 by knocking over New York Rangers. The victory was the second straight Stanley Cup victory for Gorman who led Chicago Black Hawks to world championship honors last season and joined Maroons shortly before the 1934-35 training camp period opened.

Leads Fought Doggedly
Toronto fought doggedly but could not subdue the sturdy Maroon defence which made no errors all night. When they did break through, Alex Connell was unimpressive. Maroons played their scoring chances coolly to net a goal in the first period and two more within 12 seconds of each other in the second after Toronto had tied the score. A breakaway goal early in the third period was the finishing blow for the game. Toronto squad that never stopped trying.

Back on home ice after two victories in Toronto, Maroons found a perfect setting for their third win. A crowded Forum sensed a Cup victory after a wait of nine years since 1926.

Maroons responded to the welcome by assuming command of the game almost throughout. Toronto's lightning thrusts by Charlie Conacher and Harvey Jackson, daring rushes by Happy Day and King Clancy, and power plays in which Ken Dorsey tried unavailingly to repeat his famed scoring plays of other years, fell before the defence.

In the last minute of the first period, Lionel Conacher took a penalty for tripping Red Metz and Charlie Conacher rushed five forwards on the ice. They were struggling around Maroons goal when Jimmy Ward trapped them. He need for Hainsworth's end. Charlie Conacher caught up with him but Ward got a shot away. Baldy Northcott picked up the rebound and shot. Again there was a rebound and Ward hammered it home for the first goal.

Bone Crushing Attack
Toronto began a bone crushing attack in the second period which it seemed most likely produce goals. It did, at the 12 minute mark, when King Clancy opened a gang attack. Bill Thoms worked clear on left and took Frankie Finnigan's short pass for the equalizer.

Four minutes later Maroons struck with lightning suddenness for two goals and victory. Gus Marker hurled a pass to Ward and raced for the goal mouth. Ward shot and Baldy, almost in the crease, tipped it home. The puck was barely faced off when Northcott gave Cy Wentworth the puck into the Toronto blue line and the sturdy defenceman worked doggedly past Red Horner and Clancy for a rising scoring shot.

Wentworth opened the third period with a breakaway rush, Gus Marker, injured in the first Toronto game, trailed the defence and gave the right winger a clear path for a score.

For the next 10 minutes Maroons defence took a terrific hammering as Conny Smythe kept waves of hard hitting forwards swirling in

Standing room will likely be at a premium at tonight's encounter and if vocal support is any help at all the series should be prolonged to a fourth game.

MONTREAL FANS are today singing the praises of Tommy Gorman and his hustling Maroons as the big red team made their rush through the playoffs complete by taking their third straight victory from Toronto Maple Leafs and capturing the Stanley Cup for the first time in nine years. It was Gorman's second straight Cup triumph and by his work this season he no doubt will now be ranked on even footing with the best of National League coaches.

TO TAKE THREE straight from a team the calibre of the Leafs seemed a remote possibility at time during the season but the Maroons showed they cared little for reputations when it came to the final payoff. After losing five out of six games to the men of the Montrealers certainly took an opportune time to avenge their revenge and the manner in which they paraded through the National League champs was impressive to say the least.

MAGNIFICENT display of silver trophies is to be seen in the show-window of M. A. Campbell's jewelry store, Queen Street. Numbering 32, the cups present a striking appearance and are donated for bowling, badminton, billiards and basketball championships of the Holy Name Club for the season now drawing to a close.

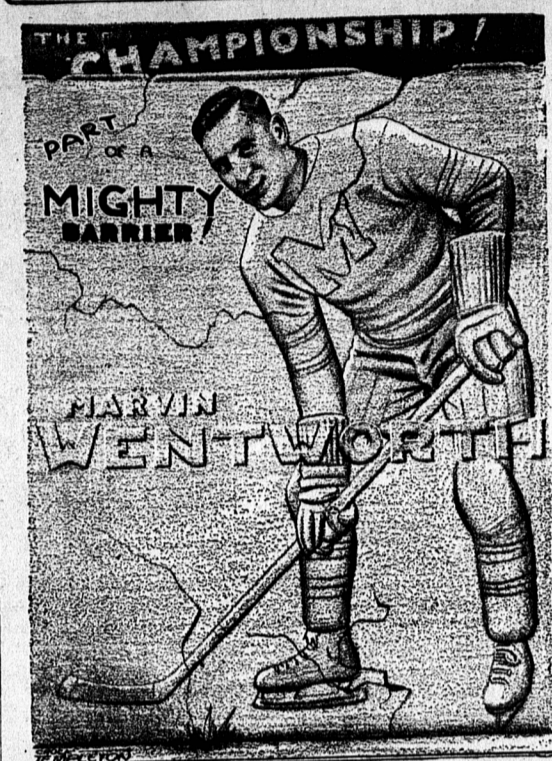

Royals And Wolverines Resume Hostilities In Halifax Forum Tonight

HALIFAX, April 9—Enjoying a brief truce in their battle for the Eastern Canadian Amateur Hockey championship, Montreal Royals and Halifax Wolverines sought various forms of amusements tonight as they awaited a resumption of hostilities in which the invaders have already captured one Halifax trench.

Coach Don Peniston and his heroic "bunch of kids," who defeated the Maritime Champions 4-2 last night after holding them to a 3-3 overtime tie in the opening encounter Saturday, were sitting around their hotel doing some long-distance cheering for Montreal Maroons in the Stanley Cup clash with Toronto Maple Leafs.

Coach "Red" Stuart, who started Ferguson, Lawlor and Shields on the attack last night, said he would put his old favorites, McGlashen, Hudson and Lennon, into the battle first tomorrow.

Coach of the Royals' fine showing last night could be credited to Coach Don Peniston for the smart manner in which he handled his club, particularly when the Royals had their back to the wall," said Manager Jack Adams of the Detroit Red Wings, one of the big league scouts here seeking professional prospects.

Either a win or a draw in tomorrow night's game will put Royals into the Allan Cup series against Port Arthur Bearcats, Western Champions, who arrived last night for their first workout at the Forum today.

BAER OFFERED \$300,000 CONTRACT

Charlie Harvey Representing a German Promoter Arrives With Proposition.

NEW YORK, April 9—A contract offering Max Baer \$300,000 for a heavyweight title defence against Max Schmeling in Europe Aug. 17 arrived today with Charlie Harvey, veteran fight manager, who is representing Walter Rothenburg, German promoter.

The site of the prospective bout has not been determined, said Harvey, but the White City stadium outside of London, Rome and Vienna are possibilities with Rome apparently holding the inside track. Returning on the Ile de France with his heavy-weight, Steve Hamas, who was trounced by Schmeling in Hamburg several weeks ago, Harvey visualized the German promoter as a "second Tex Rickard" with an equally expansive imagination and "the money to back it up."

"Here is the contract," he said, displaying a legal looking document, drawn-up in German. "I'll submit it to Anell Hoffman, Baer's manager. I understand Hoffman is interested in having the money put on the line." This fellow Rothenburg acts as well as talks and he'll deposit the money in any bank Hoffman names just as he placed Hamas' \$25,000 for the Schmeling match in a New York bank before we sailed.

Two financial propositions were made. The first calls for Baer to receive \$150,000 four weeks before the fight and the remaining \$150,000 ten days before he climbs into the ring with Schmeling. The alternative proposition offers Baer \$15,000 upon arrival in Europe and the balance after the fight.

No Future For Mercantile Hockey Claims Gilroy; C.A.H.A. Meeting Today

HALIFAX, April 9.—Leading a large coalition of Canadian Amateur Hockey Association officials into its Capital City of the year tonight, President E. A. Gilroy of Portage La Prairie, Man., predicted mercantile hockey would make little headway in the graces of the Association this year or for some time to come.

Except for saying the commercial game could never get far even if there was a Dominion-wide emigration of teams to it from the C. A. H. A. because it did not develop the younger players, President Gilroy refused to talk about the subject.

The twice-delayed annual meeting of the C. A. H. A. would be held tomorrow, he said. Originally scheduled to begin sessions Monday, the meeting was successively postponed until today and then till tomorrow while members awaited his arrival. He was in town tonight to attend the sessions.

Reports from President Gilroy, Registrar W. A. Hewitt of Toronto, Secretary Fred Marples of Winnipeg, and from several committees make up the routine agenda for the early part of the meeting. After that complaints and suggestions from various branches will be aired.

President Gilroy was surprised that there had been a misinterpretation of the play-off rules here regarding the length of the series between Halifax Wolverines and Montreal Royals. The new two-out-of-three rule, making it necessary for a team to gather four clear points for a win, was passed near the end of last year's annual meeting, he said.
