District Association Organized at Staley.

FIELD SEC'Y PRESENT.

An Excellent Program Carried Out With Great Interest in the Work.

A number of persons interested in Sunday School work gathered in the Presbyterian Church at Stanley Bridge on Monday afternoon last. Rev. M. H. McIntosh conducted devotional exercises, and then introduced the Field Secretary (Rev. G. P. Raymond of Charlottetown), who explained that the main object of the first session was to organize, if thought wise, a District Association. At the evening session a fairly large audience gathered, the busy season probably hindering some from attending. Rev. A. E. Hooper, Pastor of the Cavendish Baptist Church, conducted devotional exercises.

The President explained the work of the afternoon and then introduced Mrs. (Rev.) A. E. Hooper, who read a most interesting and excellently prepared paper on the subject—"Building for Eternity." The writer of the paper pointed out clearly the great opportunity for laying good foundations for moral character afforded in Sunday School work, and beautifully adorned the subject matter of her article with well chosen quotations. Rev. Geo. Miller spoke briefly commending the excellence of the paper. He said that the parents and teacher should endeavor to bring the children, under their care, into personal relation with the Savior as early as possible. Mr. Green of Clifton also spoke on the good points of the paper.

The choir rendered an anthem which was very appropriate and much enjoyed. The Field Secretary explained the objects and benefits of Normal teacher training classes and Home Departments.

Rev. Geo. Miller spoke next and plainly showed his deep interest in Sunday school work. He explained the working of the Home Department in his church during the past winter. Many questions handed in were answered by the Field Secretary and others.

The convention closed by singing, "God be with you till we meet again." The next meeting of this District Association will be held with the Presbyterian Sunday School at Hunter River on August 22nd.

NO GOLD FOR FRANCE.

LONDON, May 18.—Inquiries made at the Bank of England show that there is no truth in the statement circulated by a news agency in the United States that the Bank of Paris and the Credit Lyonnais of Paris, on Tuesday and Wednesday, withdrew £5,000,000 from the Lisbon market. No gold has been withdrawn from France and the officials of the Bank of England have not heard of any withdrawals for the Russian loan, which was alleged to have been the cause of the action of the Bank of Paris and the Credit Lyonnais.

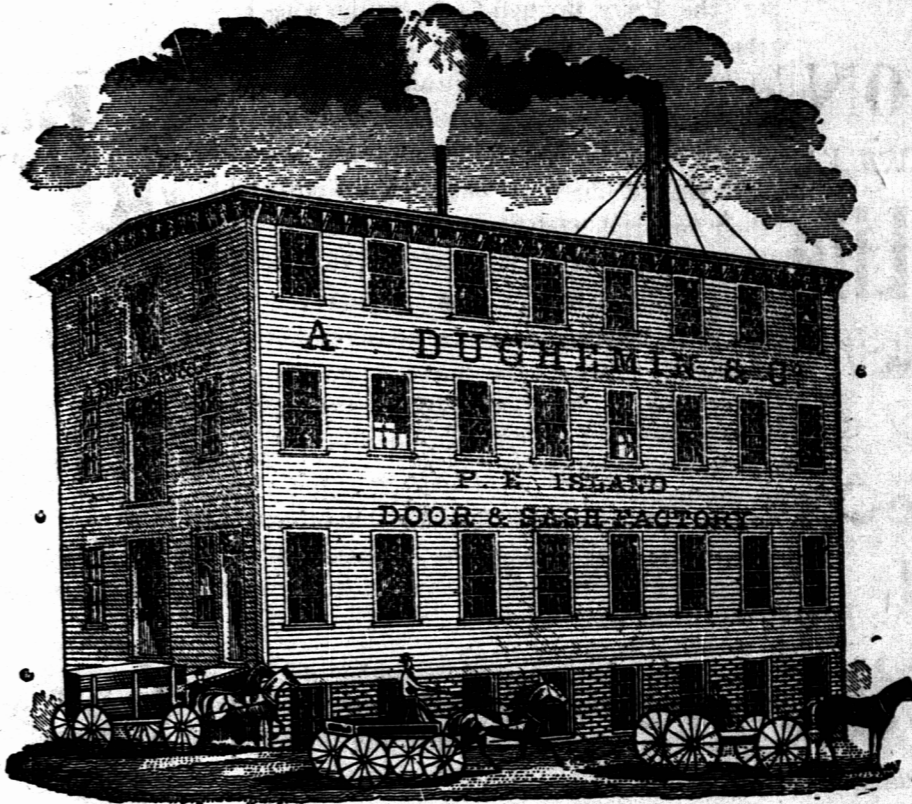

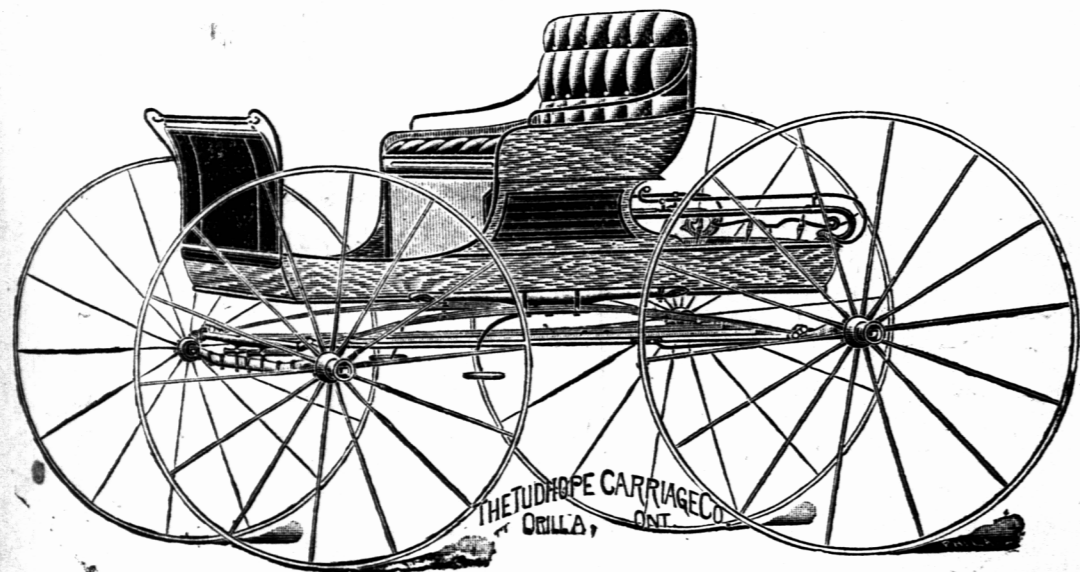
