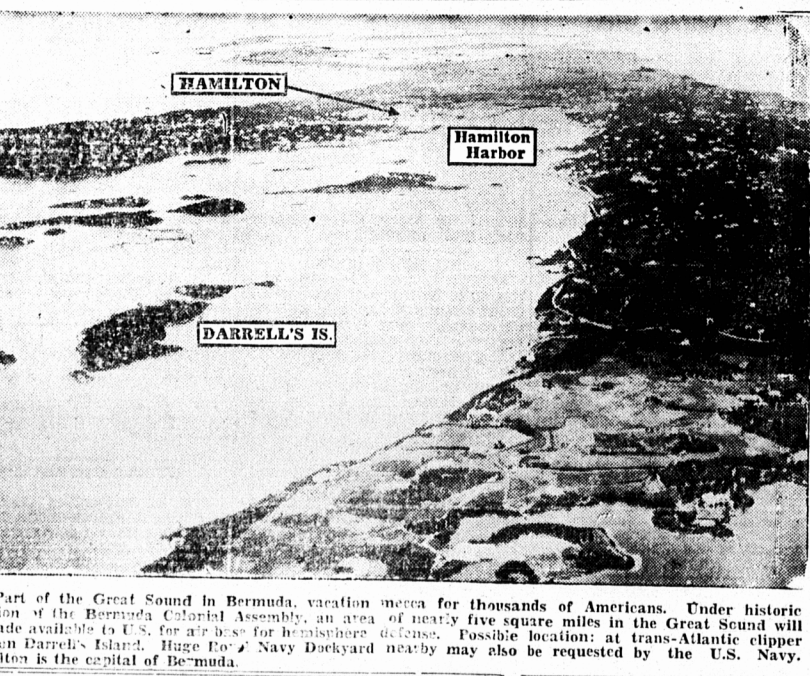

A. MacMillan, Production Service, Dominion Department of Agriculture. There is assurance as to the future level of wool prices, he said, but it is certain however, that there will be a continued demand for a greatly increased volume of wool during the period of the war and it is obvious that increased production of wool will automatically result in an advance in the output of lamb.
