OVER-PROTECTED

How often has it been said that an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure? How often have we pointed out to parents the importance of proper care for their child, in order to prevent disease and to secure for him robust health?

Undoubtedly, prevention is better than cure, and too, care is required that, also, at no time should we be carried to an extreme, they defeat their own purpose and may cause actual harm. In this connection we think of the parents who display such undue concern for their children as not to allow them to play with other children for fear that they might contract some disease from their playmates.

A thorough examination of the child fails to reveal any abnormal physical condition which would account for her pains and other complaints. The physician clearly sees that the child has drifted into the conservative attitude of the over-protective parent.

We all like to have our own way and to get out of doing unpleasant things or meeting difficult situations. This child has found an easy way to get out of school, to avoid ill-health, she has been able to avoid school when she wished to do so, and to escape any undesired work.

The situation is explained to the mother. She is encouraged to treat her daughter as a normal child, and when the little girl complains of not feeling well, to ignore it, not to display any concern about it, to encourage her to play with other children and to help to find an interesting life outside of herself.

Two Members Of Nfld. Sealing Fleet Injured

(C.F. By Guardian's Special Wire) ST. JOHN'S, March 14—Fishermen Misfortune today made his first thrust at the 1934 sealing fleet, slowly making it way up the Newfoundland coast. To the sealing grounds among the treacherous ice fields of the North Atlantic.

Premature explosion of a dynamite charge, used to blast a channel through an impassable ice field, injured two members of the fleet's crew, but the vessel was out of range of the huge chunks of flying ice and no other damage was reported in a curt message received from the ship's master, Capt. Hill.

The message said injuries had been suffered by Stanley Dyke and Harry Mellick, both of Newfoundland, when the explosion occurred, but they were given first aid by a druggist named Kavanagh and they were expected to recover.

The first loss has been reported in its trip but it was expected soon to reach the end of the ice fields, and was making faster time to its uncharted destination.
