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HOW THE ARMISTICE WAS ARRANGED FOR

German Delegation on Request of German Government was Conducted Through the Lines to Place of Meeting Designed by General Foch. Orders Given to Cease Firing.

(Special to the Guardian)
PARIS, Nov. 8.—The German Headquarters yesterday requested the Allied Headquarters by wireless to permit the passage of the German Delegation for an armistice negotiations through the lines.

An order was given to cease firing on this front at three o'clock in the afternoon until further orders.

A German wireless message asking for an appointment to meet Foch says "The German Government would congratulate itself in the interests of humanity if the arrival of the German Delegation on the Allied front might bring about a provisional suspension of hostilities. The document was published last night.

Following this there was received on the 7th of Nov. at 12.30 a. m., the following: From the General High Command by order of the German Government to Marshal Foch. The German Government having been informed through the President of the United States that Marshal Foch received power to receive accredited representatives of the German Government and communicate them conditions of armistice the following plenipotentiaries have been named by it: Matthias Erzberger, General H. K. A. Winterfeld, Count Alfred von Oberndorff, General von Gruenell and naval Captain von Salow.

The plenipotentiaries request they be informed by wireless of the place where they can meet Marshal Foch. They will proceed by automobile with the subordinates of the staff to the place thus appointed.

Orders were given to cease firing on the front at three o'clock p. m. until further orders.

On November 7 at 1.25 a. m. Marshal Foch sent the following to the German Command, if the German plenipotentiaries desire to meet Marshal Foch and ask him for an armistice, they will present themselves to the French outposts by the Chimay, Fourmies-Lachapelle, Guise Road. Orders have been given to receive them and conduct them to the spot fixed for meeting.

A German wireless despatch received Thursday at 1 p. m. said "German General Headquarters to the Allied General Headquarters: The German Commander-in-Chief to Marshal Foch. The German plenipotentiaries for an armistice leave Spa today. They will leave here at noon and reach at five o'clock this afternoon, the French outposts by Chimay-Fourmies-Lachapelle and Guise Road. There will be ten persons in all headed by Secretary of State, Erzberger.

The following wireless despatch was received at 1.05 p. m.: German General Headquarters to Allied General Headquarters: Supreme German Command to Marshal Foch from the German outposts to the French outposts. 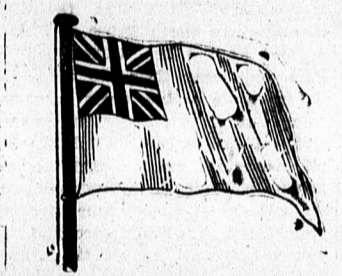
LONDON, Nov. 8.—The House of Commons today passed on third reading the bill permitting women to sit in Parliament.

MACKENSEN MAY PASS BUT WITHOUT ARMS

BERNE, Nov. 8.—The German Field Marshal Mackensen on requesting permission for his army to pass through Hungary from the Balkans to Germany was informed by the Hungarian Government that the request would be granted on the condition that the troops lay down arms on entering Hungarian soil. The arms are to be forwarded to Germany later.

British Shipping Lost and Replaced

LONDON, Nov. 7.—Speaking in the House of Commons today right Hon. Thomas James Macnamara, Parliamentary Secretary to the Admiralty, states that 8,947,000 tons of British merchant ships had been lost during the war up to September 30 last by enemy action. Of the number 5,443,000 tons had been replaced by new construction and by the purchase of ships abroad and the utilization of captured enemy ships.

WHOLE GERMAN FLEET NOW IN REVOLT

The Men Have Revolted and are Now Complete Masters of the Ships and Defences at Kiel and Other German Naval Bases, on Strike Demanding Peace.

LONDON, Nov. 8.—Virtually all the German fleet has revolted, according to a despatch received from the Hague. The men are complete masters at Kiel, Wilhelmshaven, Heligoland, Borkum and Cuxhaven. At Kiel the workers have joined the navy men and declared a general strike. The greater part of the submarines crews in all the German naval harbors have joined the revolution, according to an Exchange Telegraph despatch from Copenhagen.

REVOLUTION GROWS OVER NORTHERN GERMANY

Important Cities Now in Hands of Revolutionists. Maritime City of Hamburg in Open Revolt and Red Flag Flying on all Ships in Harbour.

COPENHAGEN, Nov. 8.—The German revolution was reported today to have spread into Mecklenburg Schwerin and East Prussia, thus extending across practically the whole northern portion of the Empire.

Despatches report the cities of Schwerin, capital of the Grand Duchy of Mecklenburg Schwerin and Tilsit, one of the principal cities of East Prussia, had joined the revolt.

KAISER MUST GO SAYS GERMAN PARTY

It is Declared He Must Abdicate This Time Sure.

LONDON, Nov. 8.—The German majority parties have held a final discussion on the question of Emperor William's abdication and will without doubt unanimously demand that he abdicate, according to a Berlin despatch to the Copenhagen Politiken.

RENA MCLEAN HOSPITAL MEMORIAL

While celebrating our great victory and the ending of the war, those who have made the great sacrifice are naturally remembered by a grateful nation. Among those of this province who gave their lives for their country, none, perhaps, will be longer remembered than Miss Rena McLean, of Souris, daughter of Senator John McLean. Miss McLean volunteered upon the outbreak of the war, and nearly four years gave her entire services in caring for our wounded soldiers.

All will remember her tragic death by the torpedoing of the Hospital Ship "Llandovey Castle." And as she was the only Prince Edward Island nurse lost on this ship, and in loving memorial for the great services rendered her country, it was suggested at a meeting of the Charlottetown Club last night that a fitting memorial be established in connection with the Prince Edward Island Hospital, to be known as the Rena McLean Memorial.
