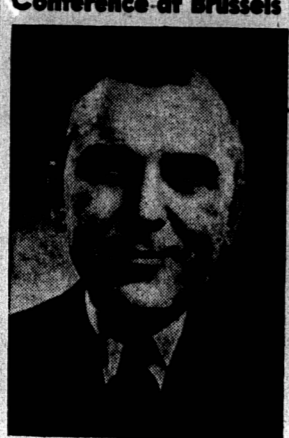

The R.C.A.F. Red Sox came
from behind to defeat Holmans in
a regular league game at the

Detroit Boat Wins Opening Harmsworth Race

DETROIT, July 29 - (CP) - A
smooth-riding Detroit boat gave
the United States a first-race vic-
tory today in the 20th renewal of
the historic Harmsworth speed-
boat trophy race. The lone Cana-
dian challenger, Miss Canada IV,
finished third.
Away to a somewhat poor start,
Such Crust I, owned by Jack Shafer
of Detroit, roared over the 48.3-
statute-mile course at a speed
sometimes topping 100 miles an
hour. Although she reached a lap
record of 94.94 statute miles an
hour, her average for the day's
race was 79.99 miles an hour.
Miss Canada IV, driven by Har-
old Wilson of Ingersoll, Ont., got
away to a slow start and was
never able to offer any competi-
tion to the United States defend-
ers.

Under the Harmsworth rules,
a competing country must win two
races to take the trophy. Thus if
the United States team can win
again tomorrow, the trophy re-
mains in the United States. If
Miss Canada can get going and
win Saturday's second race, a
third heat will be needed. It will
be run Monday, if necessary.
Today was the first U. S. de-
fence of the trophy since Gar
Wood defended it in 1933.

Heavier Summer Tourist Traffic To Maritimes Reported

MONCTON, N. B., July 29 - The
heaviest summer tourist traffic in
the Maritimes and other sections
of Canada and the United States.
So much so that both traffic
and transportation officers of the
area have been getting into a
dither and out again so often in
their efforts to muster enough
railway cars to look after every-
one that they have reached a stage
where they are nearly beside
themselves.

As reservations pour in, addi-
tional cars are added to the train
until its 16 car limit has been
reached and the growing popu-
lar waiting list for accom-
modation. Cars are commandeered
and a section of the train is
set up and out again so often in
limit with reservations continuing
to come in.

"The heavy tourist travel began
in the first week of July," Edgar
Robertson, general superintendent
of transportation for the re-
gion, told newsmen. "It hasn't let
up since, and from all indications
will probably continue until about
September 10th. Criterion of the
volume of passenger traffic we
will operate approximately 150
cars, including those in extra sec-
tions, on trains between Halifax
and Montreal."

Principal reasons for the in-
creased traffic to the region, said

Frank L. Dougan, general passen-
ger agent of the Canadian Na-
tional Railways, are the growing popu-
larity of the Maritimes as a sum-
mer vacation area, the bicentenary
of Halifax and other celebrations in
Cape Breton in Nova Scotia, the
New Brunswick and in Prince
Edward Island, and a desire to
see Newfoundland, Canada's newest
province, were other attrac-
tions to tourists.

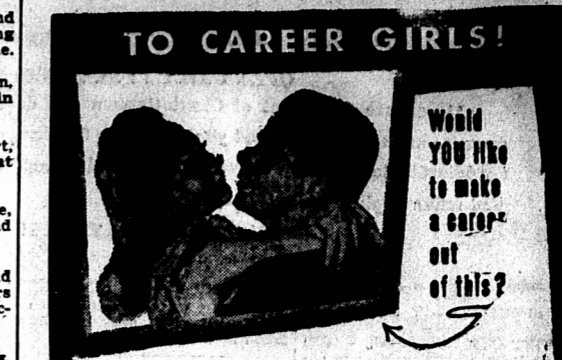
