B., Nov. 5.—As was expected for some days a decline has taken place in the price of Manitoba flour which went down 20 cents on the local market this morning, following a fall of 25 cents which was quoted in Ontario patents last week. 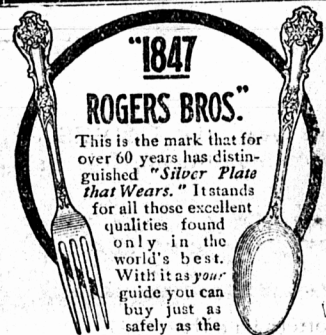

THE SUFFRAGE MOVEMENT GETS SET BACK

LONDON, Nov. 5.—The suffrage movement suffered a set-back in the House of Commons to-day when an amendment providing for women suffrage which it was desired to include in the Home Rule Bill for Ireland was defeated by 314 against 141 votes. The suffragettes declare that they will retaliate by organizing outbreaks in Ireland.

WILSON HAS BIG MAJORITY

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—Overturning the Republican majorities in states never before captured by the Democrats, the Wilson Marshall ticket was swept into office yesterday in a great victory.

The returns received up to 11 p. m. never showed that Wilson would have almost, if not quite 400 of the electors.

531 votes in the electoral college and that Roosevelt would have nearly 100, Taft had but eight and there were 51 doubtful. The early returns indicate Democratic control of the U. S. Senate. There was a general increase in socialist vote pulled by Debs but the only socialist in the House of Representatives, congressman Berger, of Wisconsin was beaten and nearly all the socialist candidates in Schenectady, New York, were defeated before they elected almost the complete ticket.

Few American campaigns have run through a longer period of heated controversy. The fight for the presidency was under way early in February, and has scarcely lagged since that time. Out of the eight men who were active candidates for presidential nomination early in the summer, three candidates representing three parties whose relative strength up to yesterday was a matter of conjecture, remained.

CHANGE IN ATHLETIC SITUATION

VANCOUVER, B. C., Nov. 6.—The control of athletics in Canada will be shifted to Western Canada for the next year, at least if the recommendations of the British Columbia A. A. Union are adopted by the A. A. U. of Canada at its annual meeting in Toronto on November 23rd. They ask that the presidency and Secretaryship be transferred to the West and also the 1413 track and field and boxing championships.
