Death Occurs Of Ludwig III.

LONDON, Oct. 21.—An Exchange Telegraph despatch from Vienna today states that a report has been received there of the death of Ludwig III, former King of Bavaria, at Sarar Castle in Hungary. Owing to the Burgenland troubles in Hungary, telegraphing is practically suspended from that country and it is difficult to obtain authoritative information of events occurring there.

Ludwig III, a picturesque figure in Europe for three quarters of a century, renounced his throne as King of Bavaria, on November 16, 1918, having held it a scant three years. Disaster broke heavily upon the venerable ruler, as his wife, Maria Theresa, who was princess royal of Hungary and Bohemia, on the same day.

After his abdication, Ludwig fled to Switzerland and later to the Austrian Tyrol, with other royal members of his household. At one time he was reported to be living at the castle of Vaduz, under a fictitious name and also to have been driven to the Alps by Sparticides. In March, 1919, he received permission of the Swiss Government to reside at Zizers, and thither he went a few days later to take up his residence. He remained nearly a year in Switzerland, where life's vicissitudes in virtual exile and in financial distress is said to have threatened his sanity. He was severely ill for several months and once was erroneously reported dead.

On December 22, 1920, Ludwig returned to Wiltenswart, Southern Bavaria, where he has remained most of the time since. Bavarian royalists held a monster demonstration on the occasion of the 76th anniversary of his birth, last January 7.

A Reuter despatch from Budapest says Ludwig died today.

3,000 Tons of German Toys in Holds of Steamers Just Arrived

BOSTON, Oct. 21.—The approach of the Christmas season was marked by the arrival here today of about three thousand tons of German toys in the holds of the American steamer Deranof from Hamburg and Bremerhaven. Part of the shipment will be unloaded here and the remainder at Philadelphia.

"The Way Of The Transgressor Is Hard"

England's policy of '93, hoisted the signal for a retreat when he declared that the 1919 declaration was merely made to "get in on" and should not be taken seriously; and today the spectacle is being witnessed of the entire party either slurring over or trying to evade its pledges. The Canadian people must not be fooled or betrayed by this cynical insult to their intelligence. They cannot afford to risk their economic prosperity to the promises and vagaries of such men. They must judge the Liberal party by its platform and by its platform alone.

Upon the tariff that platform says:

That to these ends, wheat, flour and all products of wheat, the principle articles of food; farm implements and machinery; farm tractors, mining, flour and saw-mill machinery and repair parts thereof; rough and partly dressed lumber; gasoline, illuminating, lubricating and fuel oils; nets, twines and fishermen's equipments; cement and fertilizers, should be free from Customs duties, as well as the raw material entering into the same.

That a revision downwards of the tariff should be made whereby substantial reductions should be effected in the duties on wearing apparel and footwear, and on other articles of general consumption (other than luxuries), as well as on the raw material entering into the manufacture of the same.

That the British preference be increased to 50 per cent of the general tariff.

And the Liberal Party hereby pledges itself to implement by legislation the provisions of this resolution when returned to power. This platform, put into force, would be destructive of Canadian industry. It would mean absolute free trade in all products of the farm, the forest and the sea; it would wipe out all duties on manufactured foodstuffs, it would strike at industries whose loss would be catastrophic; it would, to all intents and purposes, as well as in its consequences, be as disastrous as absolute Free Trade.

Canada cannot afford to trifle with such a platform. It cannot afford to risk an investment of hundreds of millions of dollars; the employment and livelihood of tens of thousands of its citizens; the best portion of its home market. Not unless it is prepared to turn its back upon prosperity to tear down what the achievements and the sanity of fifty years have builded, to make Canada into a mere market garden for the rich United States.

SUBJECT TO RADICAL DICTATION.

It is not enough to trust to Liberal pleadings that the platform doesn't mean what it says. It is not enough to point to the betrayal of 1896. We cannot rely upon a party with cynicism and a record of treason as its reference. Moreover, remember this. Remember that there is a difference between 1896 and 1911 in '96 the Liberal party entered office with a clear majority of its own. Today it would be different. Any Liberal administration that might be formed would be subject to the dictation of the Radicals of Ontario and the West, to its Free Trade wing; and the industrial East would be sacrificed upon the altar of political gain in the West. Crear and Wood and Drury, not the halfhearted tariff men of the East, would exercise policy and control.

Hence it is that the public today must judge the Liberal party by its platform. Pussyfooting inter-
