## THE JAPANESE IN B. COLUMBIA

### Great Uneasiness Felt, Another Steamer Load Coming; Mayor Bethune Says Vancouver Will Pay No Damages; Jap Consul Reports to The Consul General

VICTORIA, B. C., Sept. 10.—(Special)—Great uneasiness is felt here in consequence of the anti-Asiatic riot in Vancouver.

A steamer has left Honolulu with another consignment of Japanese laborers for Vancouver.

Intense excitement prevails throughout British Columbia as a result of the riot.

Mayor Bethune declares the city will pay no damages for the wrecked buildings.

The situation is growing worse with the arrival of more Orientals.

OTTAWA, Sept. 10.—(Special)—The following telegram was received this morning by Japanese Consul Gen. Nasse from Consul Marakiwa at Vancouver.

"About ten thirty last night, Monday, rioters set the Japanese Primary School on fire, but the building was saved from destruction by the Japanese."

"I at once interviewed the Mayor at the police station and made a demand to call up the militia whenever necessary."

The Consul General says: "I am merely passing to the Premier the fact of the case as I am informed by Telegram."

"For the rest I rely on the good sense of the British and Canadian Governments

who have always treated us fairly. "I am satisfied that they will do so in the future and that our people will have the protection of the Canadian law."

Ottawa, Sept. 9.—The following message was sent by Sir Wilfrid Laurier to the mayor of Vancouver:

"Ottawa, Sept. 9, 1907. "His excellency the governor-general has learned with the deepest regret of the indignities and cruelties which certain subjects of the Emperor of Japan, a friend and ally of his majesty the king, have been the victims and he hopes that peace will be promptly restored and all the offenders punished."

## WORD RECEIVED FROM STEFANSSON

New York, Sept. 9.—Confirmation of the report that the Stefansson expedition is safe, was given in a message received at the offices of the American geographical society in this city today from the Vilhjalmur Stefansson, the ethnologist, a leader of the expedition into the Arctic. The message was dated at Eagle City, Alaska, which is on the upper Yukon River, and read as follows: "Expedition is all safe."

(Signed) "Stefansson."

Officers of the Geographical Society said they supposed the message had been forwarded by messenger from Herschel Island to Eagle City.

## FIELDING HOME BRODEUR REMAINS

OTTAWA, September 9.—It is expected that Hon. William Fielding will sail for Canada within a few days. It is likely that Hon. Mr. Brodeur, who has been associated with the Finance Minister in the negotiations for a commercial treaty with France, will not leave until some time later. Mr. Brodeur has some important business to look after in connection with the new ice breaker which it is proposed to have built for the winter navigation between Prince Edward Island and the mainland. Mr. Brodeur will probably not leave Europe until the end of September.

## JAPAN SEIZES PRATAS ISLAND

### Coral Reef and Harbor Near Philippines; of Great Value as Base.

New York Sept. 9.—The New York Herald prints the following from Washington:

The Herald's cable from Yokohama saying that Japanese "explorers" had occupied and hoisted the national flag over the island of Pratas, near the Philippines, attracted much attention here, because by this act has been added to Japanese territory an island with 120 miles of the Philippines, which would furnish an admirable naval base.

Japanese possession are brought almost within the archipelago, because Pratas Island is less than 60 miles north of the 20th parallel, which was the northern boundary of the former Spanish domains defined by the treaty of Paris.

## D. S. McQUARRIE CASE DISMISSED

### There Was Not The Slightest Testimony to Prove the Charge

A Prohibition case which looked very much as if its being brought to Court was the outcome of a plot for of malice, was charged by those accused was heard at the Police Court yesterday before Stipendiary MacDonald.

In this case Prosecutor Jenkins acting on information supplied him, had D. S. McQuarrie, a merchant of Craapud Corner summoned for infraction of the Prohibition Law.

The first witness examined was Russell Howatt who testified that he knew Mr. McQuarrie and had been in the store. He had never procured any intoxicating liquor there nor never asked for any. He never knew of it being sold there. He had not procured any liquor there since there such as lemonade and ginger ale. He had never taken any liquor away from Mr. McQuarrie's store and never suspected that he sold liquor.

Other witnesses examined were Fraser McDonald, Camden Holland, David Holmes, Wm. McQuarrie, and Ernest Thompson, all of whom gave testimony similar to that of the first witness, stating without question that they never had any beer in Mr. McQuarrie's store but had never asked for any nor had him procure any, nor did they ever have reason to suppose that he had ever been engaged in such a business as selling liquor directly or indirectly.

The case was so evidently one without a leg to stand on, going by the evidence, that the Magistrate promptly dismissed it on request of A. B. Warburton, Mr. McQuarrie's counsel.

Mr. McQuarrie, who was put on the witness stand at Mr. Warburton's request, emphatically denied that he had ever in the remotest way had anything to do with the procuring of liquor or distributing it. He said that the circulation of this charge would do him and his business harm and he wished to have himself put right with the public.

The Magistrate said that evidently in this case there had been some malice at the bottom of the charges which had been made to prosecutor Jenkins, who had brought the case to court in good faith believing that his information had been true. The Magistrate deprecated the work of such parties and of those who circulated slanders and said they should be punished and that the Court would do all it could to punish them.

Inspector Jenkins regretted very much that the action had been brought. He had been misled and he publicly apologized to Mr. McQuarrie.

There was no doubt in His Honor's mind that the case had been brought without any cause and he therefore dismissed it.
