BAD FIRE

(Continued from page one.) While little tongues of fire showed their way out of various parts of the roof, and all along the walls, with myriads of flying and falling sparks, with the firemen at various points bravely holding on to their hoses and sending steady streams of water on the flames, what time they took such protection they could against the showering sparks and bits of burning wood—the spectacle was appallingly grand; its effect heightened by the sound of falling timbers as the burned roof caved in; the crashes of breaking wood as the firemen plied their axes and other implements in order to get clear space to get at the flames; the swish of the water from the pipes and the hiss of the steam as the two elements met; the lurid glare reflected in the faces of the crowd around; the hurrying figures of the fire-fighters.

The Fire Brigade did excellent work and within three quarters of an hour after the alarm was given had got the flames pretty well under control, and had confined them to the building in which they were; it being a matter for wonder that they kept practically intact the large coal shed immediately adjoining the southern end of the burning building.

At three thirty-five the alarm was sounded for 'Fire Out.' The building is almost totally destroyed, but is pretty well covered with insurance. It was not ascertainable last night whether the stock was also insured. It is not yet known how the fire originated.
