HOT WEATHER UNIFORMS FOR MAIL CARRIERS.

OTTAWA, July 21—Nasty hot weather uniforms for the letter carriers in all Canadian cities are being issued by the Post Office department.

Mail carriers will be provided with blue blouses of light material with gilt buttons and gold braid trimmings. Cool pith helmets will replace the present heavier headgear.

This humane reform has been inaugurated in response to many requests received from letter carriers for a saner hot weather uniform.

FOREST FIRES RAGE THROUGHOUT CANADA.

VANCOUVER, July 21—Damaged estimated at \$500,000 has been caused by forest fires at Squamish. The timber belt through which the flames fought their way is one of the finest in British Columbia.

AMHERST, July 21—Forest fires in Cumberland Co. still rage with unabated violence. The smoke is visible for thirty miles. So far the Shulce timber Co. operated by Robinson & Wright have been the heaviest losers. It is estimated that the fire has swept over 1000 acres of their holdings, destroying vast quantities of green timber.

The village of Shulce has been in constant danger all this week and fears are still entertained for dwellings there.

TORONTO, July 19—Rev. George M. Atlas arrived at the Union station this afternoon at 4.30 o'clock on the International Limited.

Rev. Mr. Atlas said he would at once take up Presbyterian missionary work in Toronto. The Atlas case attached a great deal of attention here and he was twice tried and once convicted and later acquitted on the charge of obtaining money under false pretences.
