### Gigantic Plan To End Depression Is Made Known

WASHINGTON, May 7.—A gigantic plan designed to put at least 3,000,000 men back to work in private industry of the United States on a specified date had been revealed here today. It was reported as having the backing of 25 chosen representatives of 56,000 manufacturers.

Two Brothers, Kenneth And Cyril Buck, Figure In Abduction Of "Peggy" McMath — \$60,000 Ransom Money Is Recovered

HARWICHPORT, Mass., May 7.—Kenneth Buck, 28-year-old kidnaper of Margaret "Peggy" McMath, today re-enacted the crime for which he and his brother Cyril, 41, were arrested yesterday.

Extortion Charge  
Kenneth will face a charge of kidnapping and his brother, confessed go-between in the negotiations that led up to the payment of the ransom and the subsequent recovery Friday of the child kidnapped three days before, will answer to a charge of extortion.
