Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any one over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency Sub-Agency for the District. Entry is made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

February 11, 1917. JESUS AND THE WOMAN OF SAMARIA (John 4:5-13, 24-26)

Golden Text.—"Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners."—I. Timothy, 1:15.

Verses 5-14. It was a day of surprises for the woman of Samaria as she went forth to draw water from the well of Jacob. The first surprise of the day was the sight of a Jew at the well. Jews were not accustomed to spend their time in that region. They were rarely seen in Samaritan territory.

There is something pathetic in that plea. And it expresses the yearning of countless weary and hungry members of the human race. Even since the sentence, "In the sweat of thy face shalt thou eat bread," men have toiled and labored to reach a condition in which the sentence could not apply to them. All provisions for old age, all elaborate schemes of insurance and all mutual aid associations are in essence the expressions of this woman's call for the means that could save her toil and sweat from the physical to the moral sphere.

NETHERLANDS DECLINES TO FOLLOW U.S.

(Special to The Guardian.) WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—The Netherlands Government, through the United States legation at The Hague has formally declined to accept President Wilson's suggestion that it follow the course of the United States in breaking of diplomatic relations with Germany.

ORANGEMEN MEET IN ANNUAL SESSION

The annual meeting of Queens County, L. O. L. was held in Barton Lodge Room at Milton on Tuesday Feb. 6th. In spite of the condition of the roads there was a good attendance of members and delegates from many sections of the county. It was reestablished on all sides that the highly esteemed county master R. W. Bro. Crisp Moore found it impossible to be present.

The chair was occupied at 11 a. m. by R. W. Bro. C. E. McKenzie, Grand Sec'y. The reports from the several District Lodges showed that during the past year there had been a large increase in membership and that the Primary Lodges throughout the whole of Queens County had made substantial progress in every respect.

An excellent programme was then carried out which included interesting and instructive addresses by the Rev. J. J. Bamford, Past Deputy Grand Chaplain; Rev. B. P. Colclough County Chaplain and C. E. McKenzie Grand Secretary. The addresses were interspersed with vocal and instrumental selections of an exceptionally high order—a distinct credit to the local talent of Milton.
