The Directors of the Charlottetown Driving Park have extended an invitation to the Senators and Congressmen of the U. S. who arrived last night and their party to attend the races this afternoon. Seats have been reserved for them on the grand stand.

THRESHING operations interfered somewhat with the attendance at the market yesterday. Oats exchanged hands at 36 cents, potatoes were sold at 25 cents, hay is possibly increasing in price but the limited amount offered may have had something to do with it, 40 to 45c prevailed.

Mr. John T. Weeks of Alberton, contemplates taking up ranching at Emerson, Manitoba, this fall and to this end is purchasing a number of fine cattle for breeding purposes in the west. Mr. Weeks' family will continue to occupy their beautiful home at Alberton.

ADVICES received by Mr. Heator McLeod state that Captain Maudsley of the English Army will be in Charlottetown on Wednesday and Thursday of this week and if suitable horses can be secured will purchase from 50 to 100. The Captain will be at Robin's Livery, Kent Street. He leaves for Summerside on Friday morning.

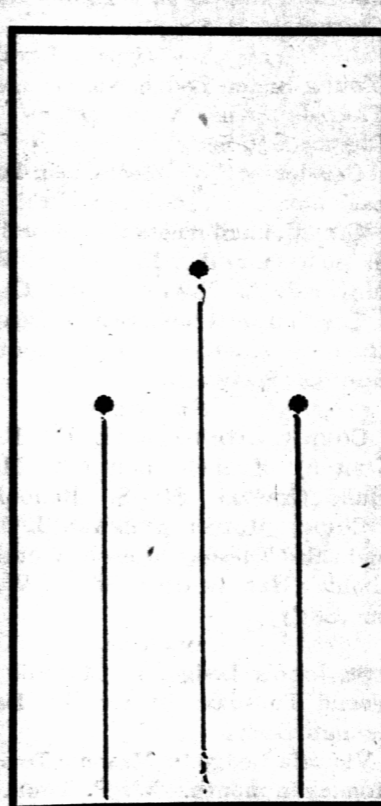
