Nfld. Settlement Threatened By Fire

(By The Canadian Press) ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., July 3.-The settlement of Roberts Arm, headquarters of woods operations for the Bowater Newfoundland paper mills, was in danger of being wiped out today by a forest fire raging along the shores of Notre Dame Bay. It could not be learned immediately whether steps were being taken to evacuate the 300 people in the little community, 200 miles northwest of here. Another fire, which has been burning along the Terra Nova River for the last week, was reported to have turned back on the settlement of Traytown and was menacing it and other villages on the south shore of Bonavista Bay.

CONSIDER MOLOTOV

(Continued from Page 1) organizations of states which might be the basis for a bloc. (2) To keep the continent disorganized because Communist political activities can be carried on better in such a condition. As United States officials see it, Molotov had two ways of promoting these objectives at Paris. He could flatly turn down co-operation with Britain and France in carrying out the Marshall plan for economic recovery, which is what he did. Or he could have agreed to some kind of co-operation, then sought to modify, stall or hamstring the plan. It was the latter alternative which authorities here expected him to take after he once agreed to meet with Foreign Ministers Bevin of Britain and Bidault of France to discuss State Secretary Marshall's proposals. As it turned out he not only refused co-operation but threatened Britain and France. Some authorities say that Molotov has actually brought about the very condition which he most feared and had an opportunity to avoid at Paris, that is, the basis for formation of a western bloc.
