OBITUARY.—At Greenvale, Prince Town Road on Friday the 21st Dec. 1900 at the advanced age of 84 years Archibald MacPherson. He emigrated from Argyllshire, Scotland with his parents in the month of August 1819 and settled on the farm on which he died (it being then in a wilderness state). On the 11th of April 1848 he married Sarah, second daughter of the late John Campbell, of Milton, who still survives him. They had a family of ten children all of whom are living except Sarah Jane who died on the 4th of August, 1871. The youngest, Joseph H., who now lives on the homestead; John A. and Archibald live on adjoining farms; Dougald, a prosperous farmer at North Wiltshire, and Donald at Darlington. His daughters are Mrs. R. McMillan, of Hunter River; Mrs. Finley Matheson, Mrs. John McLean and Mrs. D. E. Campbell, of Darlington, all of whom are in comfortable circumstances. He was a very successful farmer, a wise counsellor and a man of good judgment. He was for a number of years an Elder in the Presbyterian Church at Brookfield, a man of the highest moral attainments, kind and hospitable and upright in all his dealings. He will long be missed in the community in which he lived where his memory will be most fondly cherished and his life will be a model for all who wish to tread the paths of the righteous.

EASTERN NOTES.—The weather, that inexhaustible subject for introduction, continues variable, some days intensely cold, followed by rain and a perceptible rising of the temperature, just such weather as is supposed to produce that widely discriminated, and at present very prevalent disease, the gripe. Though a few cases of pneumonia developed here, two of which terminated fatally, this season has been generally healthy, and but little use for the services of the medical man.—The schools, seldom left out by your rural correspondents, are doing fairly well in all these parts, conducted in modern ways on the most improved methods by teachers generally well-grounded in the requirements of their profession. Though no such eulogistic reports are sent to the press, of examinations held and acquirements attained in subjects, historical, geographical, mathematical, philosophical and classical, as from other parts of the Island subjects included in the curriculum of all modern educational institutions, don't imagine for a moment but the most of our schools are well grounded in them, and at least some of their trustees competent to conduct the examinations, and appreciate and commend the breadth the depth and the thoroughness of the work.—Procuring wood and rails engrossed the attention of the farmers at present and many have now to haul them long distances. The first settlers made the mistake of cutting away too much of the woods, and now their successors have to pay for it.—Joseph Mellick of Lakeville, has tried an experiment which may yet be put in practice by some of our advanced farmers. He left part of his turnips without pulling in the field, dug them out of the snow, and used them for his stock as required, and so far considers them as superior to those he has housed.—An unusually high tide on the 25th, on these shores betokens an easterly gale in the Atlantic and the absence of a large body of ice in the Gulf.

THE Minto will leave Georgetown this morning at seven o'clock for Pictou, returning on arrival of Halifax morning train. The Stanley leaves at 2 in the afternoon and will make usual trips hereafter.

A match race will take place this afternoon on Hillsboro ice, between horses owned by J. W. Heseltine, of Cornwall, and Mr. Henry Balls, of this city. The race is for \$25 a side.

THE GUARDIAN regrets to learn that while en route to the City with Sir Louis Davies yesterday afternoon Mr. Gordon, received word of the death of his father. In consequence Mr. Gordon went to his home in River John.

MEMORIAL SERVICE.—The public schools will hold a memorial service in memory of the late Queen on Friday morning, 10 to 11 o'clock. Exercises will be held in each of the schools and will consist of exercises by the pupils and addresses by prominent citizens.

AMONG the successful P. E. Islanders who went from here to Sydney a few months ago is Mr. James A. Chappell of East Royalty. He has secured a position with Messrs Rhodes, Currie & Co who have several large contracts on hand at that place, and is at present superintending the erection of some buildings for the Dominion Coal Co, at Caledonia mines.

THERE was again last evening a great assembly of our best people in St. James' Hall last evening to listen to Rev. Mr. Fullerton's second lecture on the South African war. The ground covered was the war in Natal from the beginning down to the armored train disaster at Esourt and the arrival of General Buller. The battles of Talana Hill, Elandslaagte, Reitfontein, the disaster at Nicholson's Neck, the investment of Ladysmith were all graphically described and illustrated. For the first time during the series moving pictures were introduced. The lecturer was repeatedly and heartily applauded. The various portraits including that of King Edward at the close, and the numerous battle scenes were admirably presented and the favorite generals and personages cheered. These illustrated lectures are doubtless equal to any presentation of the war yet given in Canada.
