came the Zeppelin. There was another loud explosion—then darkness—total silence—then a rousing hip-hip hurrah from every ship in the fleet. There were 20 men aboard the Zeppelin. The burned bodies of two of them were found in the debris, some of the others tried to escape but were captured.

"At the hospitals when Zeppelins or torpedoes were reported approaching the orders were at once given 'Sisters to the Dug Outs.'" Medical Officers to their wards!" General instructions were also issued that on the approach of aircraft everybody abroad should lie flat on the ground—many of them, Miss Donkin remarked—and not all of them women either—lay flat under their beds. It was Miss Donkin's privilege (?) more than once to take refuge in a dug out, but she usually obeyed the natural instinct to first try and get a good look at the thing as it was coming.

Miss Donkin has among her souvenirs hundreds of most interesting snapshots, some of bombs in the act of exploding, several of the Zeppelin above referred to as it lay crumpled up on the ground, others of men and women watching the approach of a Zeppelin. In addition to having seen and experienced many things of startling interest she possesses the happy faculty of being able to give a vivid and graphic description. The story of her experiences, of which the above are fragmentary scraps, would fill a large volume and, written as told by herself to a representative of the Guardian would be a thrillingly interesting one. **SIGNALS RECEIVED FROM MYSTERIOUS SHIP**  
 NEW YORK, Aug. 12—Wireless of servers at shore stations near New York, were puzzled early today by signals received from an unidentified vessel, apparently somewhere off Sandy Hook, which was calling the Teisfunken wireless station in this city. The fact that the stranger refused to disclose the identity of the vessel led some of the wireless operators to believe they were at last in communication with the long-expected German submarine Bremen.

Sandy Hook observes trained their marine glasses seaward expectantly at daybreak, but everything beyond a few miles off shore was hidden in a haze and no submarine was in sight. The mysterious signals had ceased. While in communication with the shore stations a few hours earlier the stranger reported herself only as a collier and the operator on board signed his calls "D.B.U." which is the private wireless signal of the North German Lloyd steamer Breslau now reported as tied up in New Orleans for the period of the war.
