R.C.A.F. Team Defeats Abbies 6-4 In Island Baseball League Game

Playing heads-up ball behind their pitcher's effective hurling, the R. C. A. F. baseball team defeated the Abbies from Charlottetown by a score of 6-4 at Memorial Field yesterday afternoon to win their first game in the Island Baseball League. Coming from behind a four-run Abbie lead, the visiting Flyers played a great game in the last five innings and, aided by the poor judgment of the locals in the last frame, finally won the game that has eluded them in their first two encounters with the Abbies.

The locals opened the scoring in the first frame as Joey LeClair led off with a double, advanced to third on an infield out and came home when the Air Force pitcher threw wild to the plate. They increased their lead to four runs in the fourth inning as they came through with five hits. Buck Whitlock's triple highlighted the frame. But Cyril Smith on the mound for the Abbies was hitting fast and the Flyers were trying to get his offerings in the first four frames for four bingles.

In the sixth frame the Air Force came to life with a bang as they combed the offerings of Smith for two good hits, and this coupled with his own wildness gave the visitors three tallies. In the following inning they tied the ball game up when a walk, a sacrifice, and a long single accounted for the run. They scored the winning runs in the next inning. Lamy, who had replaced Greg in the inning before, led off with a single, and Cox sacrificed him to second. Labonte then rifled a single through to the outfield, scoring Lamy with their first run of the inning. Mickus kept the rally going by hitting a single with Hume hitting a long fly and Doc Lyon walking. The next batter was Bull Carson and he was safe at first on Whitlock's error. Labonte tallied on the play. Mickus tried to score also but Whitlock cut him down with a perfect throw to Perry at the plate.

In the last half of the eighth the home team made a good try to get back in the running as Buck Whitlock singled his second hit of the day, a single. But he was caught stealing second on a beautiful throw to the keystones by Jack Hume, the Flyers' catcher. Matheson flied out but Art Perry, the locals' big receiver, walloped a Mickus pitch deep into left field that was good for three bases.

The ninth inning saw the air men go down without a hit, although Barron was walked and advanced to second on a stolen base. He died there as the next two batters went down under the hurling of MacAleer.

The bottom half of the inning saw the locals put on a display of careless baserunning as they batted four singles and also had a walk credited to them but failed to score a single run. Goodwin started it off with a clean cut sin-

gle, but was caught stealing second base on another nice peg by Hume. Later, the next batter, Crinked and was also caught trying to pilfer the keystones catch on a rundown play with the pitcher, second baseman, and the first baseman all being in on the play. The next three batters, LeClair, McKinnon and Ryan, all singled. But Whitlock popped up to the centerfielder for the final out of the game.

Two really good catches were pulled off by Goodwin of the Abbies. Goodwin went far to his right into centerfield to gather in Foy's fly to rob the airman of at least two bases. Lyon made a spectacular shooting catch of Stanley's Texas Leaguer in the eighth with a runner on third base and two down.

The locals outdid the Flyers 13-10 but the Airman made their hits count for runs while the Abbies could not. Hitting honours for the afternoon were divided up between Buck Whitlock and Art Perry of the Abbies and Labonte of the winners as they each hit four runs including a rocking three-run double in the sixth frame. Whitlock and Perry each had a triple and a single to show for the afternoon. LeClair, McKinnon and Goodwin of the losers also had two hits each.

Island Marksmen Win Maritime Trophy Third Straight Year

Trailing the strong New Brunswick team by four points going up to the tough 600-yard range, Prince Edward Island's marksmen came through with an outstanding display of shooting Saturday to capture the Inter-Maritime title for the third year in a row, as they piled up a total of 258 points at that long distance while the New Brunswickers were falling back to a 248 total. It gave the Islanders only two marksmen to the runner-up while in third position was Nova Scotia representatives with a 243. The total grand scores for the meet were: E.I., 773, N.B., 765 and N.S., 755.

The big crowd of onlookers saw the winners trail the other two teams on the short 200 yard range; they sensed the comeback on the 500 as the Islanders gained back two points but they hardly expected the performance that was to come when the tilts piled up 258 out of a possible 260 points on that far-away bull on the 600.

Leading the Island team to victory was Major A.P. (Brick) Gormley, crack Island shot and former pistol man with a total of 101, just four away from a possible "Brick" had a possible on the 500 and together with W.O. 1 R. Mitchell, two marksmen to get perfect scores. Mitchell's effort also came on the 500.

Police Chief J.D. O'Connell and Capt. H.A. Flower led the New Brunswickers with 99's while Major Cyril Kennedy and H.H. Morse led the Nova Scotians with identical totals.

Although there was a bright, hot sun beating down on the range all day, which caused a bit too much glare at times, a light fall wind blowing directly on the targets made the weather high on the perfect for the meet, with the exception of a slight cross-wind during the early part of the 200-yard shoot.

Following the completion of the competitions in the afternoon, a banquet was held at the Queen Hotel in the evening with the members of the teams and the commanding officers of the local army and naval units in attendance.

In an article by Malcolm W. (Detroit Free Press) Balgout on the physical condition of ball players, or more appropriately, the lack of it, the American sportsman is faced with some pretty harsh views on the subject which would not likely meet with the approval of ball players generally, particularly if he was near at hand when someone was carrying a ball bat. However, this being the age of free speech and the author is no doubt still alive and kicking, this column will take a chance on quoting a few of his words.

"My friend Henry George Salinger writes: 'Big league baseball players are the worst conditioned of men. Every one of them is quite right, but he does not go far enough. I would say that ball players are the worst conditioned of all men, regardless of whether they are athletes or not.'

"There are, of course, certain exceptions, but the usual ball player remains in the big league because he had powerfully built features and not because of anything he does to safeguard his health. Most of them survive in the major leagues only because they are avatars of abnormal glandular powers coming down through the ages from the days of the paleolithic culture. If a man of ordinary strength lived the way the ball players do he would be dead before World Series time."

"Babe Ruth was the apotheosis of the breed. The famous blood-sweating behemoth would eat two inch-thick steaks and two dozen hotdogs, with mustard, for a light lunch before and during a game and top it off with a quart of chocolate ice cream, which he held in the palm of his hand as it saved the use of a spoon."

"My present state of puzzlement, however, is due to the lack of higher vision on the part of the master minds of baseball who should know as much about taking care of human chattels as a horse owner knows about looking after his horse. Most certainly, as a financial investment, a good ballplayer costs more than a horse. But does he get any such loving care? He does not! A horse is watched to see that he is not overworked and does not eat out more than his diet permits. Of course, if he breaks a leg they shoot him, while this is not done to ballplayers—although at times I wonder why not."

Producing the bestest racing ever seen here at a night meet and a lot keener even than some of the daylight programs the 1949 Island racing program got away with a flying start Saturday night when the largest opening night crowd ever to be on hand saw nine dashes that kept them in a continual uproar from start to finish. In the battles for the pole at the first turn, battles up the back stretch the first trip around, battles again as they came flashing by the stands and nine grueling stretch battles were part and parcel of the meeting that couldn't be beaten no matter from which angle it was looked at. It was a fitting start to what should prove to be an exceptional season for once the trotters and pacers reach their top form even keener duels of speed can be expected.

And talking about speed the meet not only produced thrills at a time when the fastest mile in the Maritimes so far this season when Vella Le Vella driven by that veteran Willard Kelly came through in the stretch in the No. 7 event to head the field in 2:10.45, a remarkable performance for so early in the season and one that stamps the Willard Kelly-owned mare as a distinct threat all during the coming campaign.

But that wasn't the only highlight by any means. There were dozens of them during the three hours racing. That old veteran converted to the trot last season came on to win the No. 6 dash from a field of four other trotters to provide the outstanding upset and pay over \$40.00 for a two dollar ticket; and he did it in the last few strides after the field had provided as pretty a racing picture as one would want to see. As they battled each other hammer and tong all during the mile keeping so close together that they could be covered with a blanket.

Then there was Teddy Weir piloting Eleanor G. in the No. 8 dash to capture the dash; Austin Tierney giving Lusia a masterly drive to beat off a field of trotters in the No. 2 race, and Harold Stead driving Calumet Onward to a win in the opening race on the card. There were other local to provide the suspense filled, surprise-filled program.

Dudly Budlong was the only double winner Lloyd O'Brien driving his horse to well deserved wins in the No. 5 and No. 4 races; Billy McVey came through as expected in the No. 4 event, and Carl Frisco did likewise in No. 3. Immediately preceding the opening race patrons were warmly welcomed by President H. J. Kennedy of the Exhibition Racing Association.

And let us forget there was another highlight for the meeting, saw Lieutenant Col. D. A. MacKinnon get up on a sulky after a few years retirement. Behind Baron "Dandy" his old self and was always in contention. He received a warm spontaneous welcome from the big crowd which was well deserved for a man who as presiding judge Dr. F. C. Dougan said had kept racing going in the Maritimes and who was responsible for making Charlotte "The Kentucky of Canada."

Capable officials handled the meeting in such a manner that the program was run off without a hitch and starter Russell Abbott on the starting gate got his fields away in apple pie order.
