LABOR DAY.

By a statute of Canada enacted in the year 1894 under the Premiership of the late Sir John Thompson, the first Monday in September yearly is declared to be a public holiday throughout all the Provinces of Canada. The legislation followed in the wake of a similar enactment in the United States, and the observance of the day is therefore common and general throughout the English-speaking countries of the North American continent.

In all monarchical countries the birthday of the reigning Sovereign is a public holiday, set apart for rest, recreation and for honor to the head of the State. This is well enough in its way, but the honest industry of a nation is always of more consequence than any single individual, however exalted his position may be. By observing Labor Day we recognize the dignity and the worth of labor. We express our sense of the fact that industry is the source of all wealth, of all progress, and a prime requisite to the happiness and the welfare of the world. In our country nearly all are workers. In the field, the mine, the workshop, the factory, in the lumber camp, the fisheries, sailing the ships, driving trains, in the store, the office, the household, the work goes on, each performing some necessary part in contributing to the supply of the general wants.

After all, the workers are the happiest people in the world. Not in anger was the mandate given, "In the sweat of thy face shalt thou eat thy bread." To be busily employed from day to day in work adapted to the taste and inclination is one of the privileges and solaces of life to the normal human being possessed of good health. Is only when forced to toil beyond one's strength, or too continuously, or in some distasteful calling, or when toil is insufficiently paid, that work becomes irksome. Yet the occasional holiday was always a necessity. It becomes more so as the stress of work becomes more pressing. It is even truer now than in the days when the proverb was written that "all work and no play makes Jack a dull boy."

And what is true of Jack is true of Jill as well, and of the father and the mother of both, especially the mother, for there is no class that we know of who have so few genuine holidays as the mothers, especially in our country households. We trust that Labor Day may be this year and from year to year for each and all a day of rest and recreation as far as possible. We are glad to learn that in this city there is a general disposition to observe the labor holiday. We trust that in towns and villages throughout the Island, and in the country districts as well, there may be a general observance of the day set apart in honor of the workers.

On Monday next, September 2nd, being Labor Day and a statutory holiday THE MORNING GUARDIAN will not be issued.

The Marconi system of wireless telegraphy has some serious drawbacks. This is a point which would require to be very carefully guarded in actual warfare.

The execution of the murderer O'Brien in Dawson City explains a dreadful crime and is a credit to Canadian justice. The crime was committed on a lonely trail in the winter season. The snow concealed the traces of the murder. It was long before the identity of the victim could be established. But with marvellous patience and at great cost the crime was brought home to O'Brien. Witnesses who had drifted away were brought back, one of them a distance of over 5,000 miles. The cost from first to last was over \$100,000, but justice was vindicated at last. Murderers seldom escape the rope in Canada.

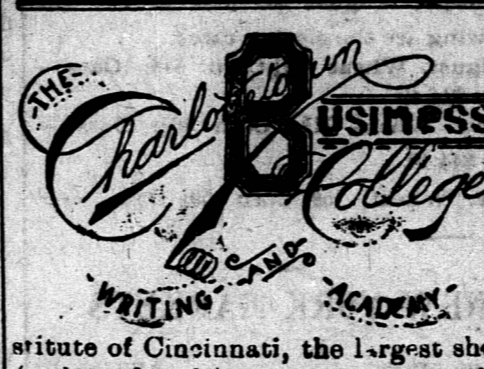
