News Briefs

LONDON, July 16 (CP)—The Earl of Coventry, previously reported as missing, was killed in action in France while serving as a lieutenant in a Worcestershire regiment, it was announced today. His five-year-old son succeeds to the title.

TORONTO, July 16 (CP)—Government officials at Queen's Park said today Premier Mitchell F. Heppner, almost completely recovered from a recent illness, will return to official duties here Thursday and has called a cabinet session for that day.

RIGA, July 16 (AP)—Three newly elected Parliament members, Estonia and Lithuania will assemble soon, it was officially announced today, with the drafting of new constitutions along Soviet lines their first task.

The counting of votes from elections Sunday and Monday began with official estimates that more than 90 per cent of those eligible in the three Baltic nations participated. Voters could vote only by ballot.

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa, July 16 (CP)—REUTERS.—John George Howard, 87, who hid Winston Churchill in a mine for three days in 1939 after Britain's Prime Minister, then a newspaperman, escaped from a prisoner's camp in the Boer War, died today. He helped Churchill flee by train to Portuguese territory, concealed in a box of wool.

LONDON, July 16 (CP)—Clement Attlee, Deputy Leader of the House of Commons, announced today that special war budgets will be introduced next Tuesday. It is expected to include sales tax.

OTTAWA, July 15 (CP)—Fisheries Minister Michael announced that careful study of the British Columbia canned salmon situation by Government advisers with regard to marketing of apples and lobsters are not applicable to canned salmon and the Government does not now propose to take any action of that kind in the latter respect.

WASHINGTON, July 16 (AP)—A large shipment from Britain by rail en route to 212,780 United States Commerce Department said today. The week's gold cargoes, including \$10,795,938 from Canada, other shipments last week included \$24,475,000 from Canada. Silver imports shipped in the week to \$667,000, including \$135,782 from Canada.

MONCTON, N. B., July 16—A pilgrimage train with 325 passengers from stations in Nova Scotia passed through Moncton today on the Canadian National Railway.

The pilgrimage is being conducted by the Rev. Father F. F. Martin, of Armadale, N. S. Returning, the pilgrimage will leave St. Anne de Beauport on Thursday.

OTTAWA, July 15 (CP)—The Norwegian crown jewels and a portion of Norway's gold bullion is now safely in New York vaults, Mrs. A. Wilson Broadbent, wife of the diplomatic correspondent of the London Daily Mail, said in an interview here today.

The Norwegian wealth was brought to North America in a recent convoy, with a particularly strong naval escort, Mrs. Broadbent said.

LONDON, July 15 (CP)—Rev. R. G. Graham, rector of Old Bollingbroke, was sentenced today to four weeks' imprisonment for ringing church bells for Sunday service June 16 in violation of a defence order that they be rung only to warn of invasion. The rector pleaded he was ignorant of the order. The judge held the bells were "intentional and deliberate."

LONDON, July 15 (CP) Welsh post who has won more than 40 barbs chairs and several crowns at the Elsted Fodau, has been detained under the defence regulations. His son Iswyn also has been detained. Both are alleged to be members of the Communist Party. The father gave up the ministry 20 years ago for dentistry.

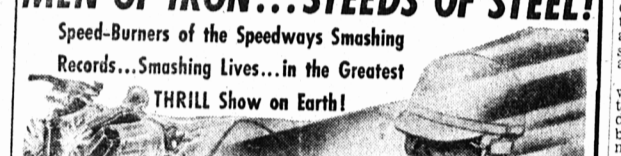
WASHINGTON, July 15 (AP)—The Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce estimated today that United States investments in foreign countries aggregated \$11,365,000,000 at the end of 1939, a decrease of \$94,000,000 in 12 months. More than two-thirds of the foreign investments were in the western hemisphere, with \$4,134,000,000 in Latin America and \$3,781,000,000 in Europe.

CHAPTER TWO

"FLASH GORDON'S TRIP TO MARS"

Stiff Penalties For Failure To Register

OTTAWA, July 15 (CP)—War Services Minister Gardiner today announced regulations governing the national registration to be taken next month and contained stiff penalties for failure to register, giving misleading information or refusing to answer questions at registration.

Mr. Gardiner also announced the appointment of registrars and assistant registrars for almost all constituencies.

Provision made for a speedy collection by means of a registration card of single men and widowers without children between the ages of 19 and 45. This, presumably, is being done to facilitate the drafting of men for military training which may be made before the registration cards of the whole population are assembled, tabulated and analyzed.

The stipulation indicates that married men and widowers with children will not be called on the first drafts.

The definition section of the regulations defines single men as men who were unmarried on July 15, 1940, and who are not in the possession of whatever call may first be made by the Department of National Defence.

The Minister said: "There is one particular matter which, because of the attention it has received in the public press, I should like to call to the attention of the members. A single man is a person who was unmarried on July 15, 1940."

"I am afraid some persons have placed more importance upon that than is warranted by the regulations."

Explains Regulation

"After all, all it could possibly mean is that a man is not married for the purposes of the first list which will be required by the militia department and from which men will be called-up for training."

"It will be found later on in the regulations that after a little time has expired, each man who has married will have to report within 30 days and he will then be listed for succeeding calls as a married person."

There had to be some definition of a single man for the purposes of the registration. Any order that was made for the Department of National Defence rather than under these regulations.

Postmasters are made continuing registrars for persons becoming eligible for registration after the registration period.

Mr. Gardiner told the House today that the government was anxious to complete the registration as early as possible and it was necessary to complete the organization by Aug. 1.

He thanked members for speedy action in nominating registrars and assistant registrars for their constituencies and announced the appointment of these officials for all but five constituencies.

Under the regulations these officials will have to be appointed by Aug. 19 as a likely date for the start of registration.
