ANNIVERSARY OF BOSTON'S BIG FIRE.

BOSTON, Mass., Nov. 8.—To many old residents of Boston tomorrow will be a day of great significance, because it will be the forty-first anniversary of the biggest fire in the city's history, when eight hundred buildings occupied by one thousand business concerns in the heart of the city were burned with a loss of about \$70,000,000 and causing the death of eleven people and injuries to many others.
The fire started at 7.20 o'clock on the evening of November 9, 1872, in the heart of the wholesale business section. The conflagration raged until the following afternoon. Fifty cities and towns of New England rushed men and apparatus to aid the Boston firemen, but the assistance was of little avail because the water supply failed at a critical moment. As a result of the fire loss twenty leading fire insurance companies went into bankruptcy.

LOUISIANA TO RAISE FUNDS.

BATON ROUGE, La., Nov. 10.—In order to make possible the borrowing of \$11,000,000 the Louisiana constitutional convention here this morning proposed an amendment to the constitution, which will permit the State to issue short time notes which are to be placed at the best interest rate available so that the maturing issue of State bonds can be taken care of January 1, is expected to meet with the opposition in the convention. The present constitution does not permit of the issuing of anything less than a fifty-year bond issue. It is also specified that no interest in excess of four per cent is to be paid. Under these restrictions it was found impossible to secure a loan, owing to the high prevailing rates.

TERRIBLE BLIZZARD.

COLUMBUS, Nov. 11.—The details of a blizzard, which raged over Ohio Sunday and Monday, show four deaths and a heavy property damage.

The bridesmaid, Miss Eleanor Germain, was prettily dressed in pink marquisette with trimmings of turquoise blue and wore pink roses. Mr. William Spencer Booth supported the groom. A wedding dinner was served at the Hotel Clermont.

SNEAK THIEF'S WORK.—Four passengers on the Boston train that arrived here at noon on Saturday were the victims of a sneak thief, between Boston and St. John, who relieved them of their watches, tickets and money, says a St. John exchange. The thief is said to be a young, respectable looking man. The persons who were robbed and their destinations are as follows: Joseph McKenzie, Chatham, (N. B.); J. A. Messervy, Charlottetown, (P. E. I.); Joseph Lavigne, Halifax, (N. S.); and James McDade, Sydney, (C. B.). Mr. McKenzie, who was going from Boston to Chatham, lost his ticket and \$33. Speaking to I. C. R. Policeman Collins on Saturday, he said that he thought he would know the thief again, and that he was robbed in the Boston station. He said that while waiting for the St. John train in Boston on Friday night, he thought he would have something to eat, and inquired of a young man standing by where he might procure a lunch. The stranger said he would show him, and took him to a restaurant where he had a light lunch. On coming out of the restaurant again, the stranger asked him where he was going. McKenzie replied that he was going to Chatham. The stranger said that he, too, was going that way, and followed him to the train, and sat down in the same seat with him. As they were getting into the seat, McKenzie thinks that the thief stole his money and ticket, which were in the vest pocket. J. A. Messervy, a middle aged man, was minus his watch when he arrived here, and immediately notified Policeman Collins that the watch was a very valuable one, and that he would not sell it for any money. Joseph Lavigne, another victim, said that he lost \$44, and that judging by the description given of the thief by McKenzie, he believed he was the same man that robbed him. Lavigne was going to Halifax, where he belongs. He notified the conductor of the theft, but the conductor could not locate the thief. James McDade told Policeman Collins that he was bound for Sydney, and that he was relieved of about \$20 by the slick stranger. He said he had two \$5 bills, and one \$10 in American money, along with some change. The four men felt their losses keenly and told their stories one after another to I. C. R. Policeman Collins, who is now looking for the thief, although Collins says there is but slight chance of finding him among all the people that pass through the depot in the course of a day.

THE BRIG FANNY.—Sixty-three years ago yesterday the Brig Fanny, left Charlottetown for California. It was a cold dreary day, the weather being not nearly as mild as that of yesterday. Mr. John Gates, an old and respected citizen is the only surviving member of those who sailed on that memorable voyage.

His selections in Highland, Lowland and Irish Bagpipe Music were keenly enjoyed and at the close of the program a hearty vote of thanks was moved by Mr. Daniel McDonald, seconded by Mr. Daniel McDonald, Hopedale, and tendered to Major Baillie in Gaelic amid enthusiastic applause, the Major making a suitable reply. Tonight Major Baillie goes to Springfield and tomorrow to French River.

HOLLAND PLANS BIG UNDERTAKING.
AMSTERDAM, Nov. 8.—The Government Commission appointed several years ago to investigate the feasibility, probable cost, and other matters relating to the proposition of reclaiming the land at present covered by the Zuiderzee, a large body of water connected with the sea and covered about 200,000 hectares, has just submitted an interesting report covering every phase and detail of the stupendous plan. It appears that the fisheries in the water

of the Zuiderzee once famous for the enormous quantities of herrings and other salt water fish caught there, have not been very profitable in recent years. It is estimated that the total value of the fish caught in the Zuiderzee does not now exceed 20,000,000 florins a year, while by the cultivation of the reclaimed land now covered by salt water 70,000,000 florins a year could be realized. The commission estimates that the cost of the work, including indemnities, etc., would not exceed 189 million florins and that the work could be completed in about 30 years.
