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Typhoid Epidemic Continues to Rage

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, March 30.—The epidemic of typhoid fever in Montreal continues to rage without abatement and this evening 1,573 cases had been registered for treatment in hospitals. All the city institutions are completely filled and emergency hospitals are rapidly being occupied.

Meanwhile side by side with the spread of malady has arisen the controversy as to its cause. It is contended on the one hand that the typhoid has its origin in contaminated milk and on the other hand it was caused by impure water. No definite decision has yet been reached and the public are as mystified as ever.

of starting a course in pursuance of the Government's policy to develop the fisheries of the Province.

Reduction of Taxation

The Premier stated that in 1923 the Government promised the people it would make claim at Ottawa for special subsidy. This, it has done with some measure of success.

We will reduce the automobile registration fee from \$5. to \$2.50. We will make a twenty per cent reduction in the Land Tax. As regards the Income Tax we will raise the present exemption of \$500 to \$750 for unmarried persons and \$1,000 for married persons.

And further, if this Government is in power for the next budget, the revision downward will be continued. (Renewed applause.) With regard to the Income Tax, provision will be made next year for married people with families.

There is no reason to doubt that within the year, of our claims are properly presented, we shall receive still larger additions to our revenue from this source. (Applause.) Some people may say, "Why do you reduce taxation? It is not necessary."

LEGISLATURE PROCEEDING

A Number of Bills Passed at Yesterday's Afternoon Session—Budget Speech Last Night.

Wednesday, March 30th. House opened about four o'clock. Mr. M. F. McDonald asked the Honorable, the Minister of Public Works if he had received a Petition from Warren Campbell and others praying that a road be opened from the Valleyfield Road to the new road leading to Montague, and what are the intentions of his Department in regard to same.

Mr. MacPhee replied that he could not give a definite answer without going into the matter further and stated that an engineer would look into it.

Mr. Tanton asked the Minister of Public Works if he had received a petition from James McGee and others praying for a new road to be opened from DeBlois Station to St. Louis Road, and if so, what are the intentions of the Department in regard to same.

Mr. Saunders presented a petition from Percy Weeks and others praying for an Act to incorporate the Saint Eleanors Electric Light Company, Limited. The bill was read for the first time.

Hon. Mr. Arsenault presented a petition from James McCallum and others praying for an Act to incorporate the Trustees of the Christian Church, Cross Road, Lot 48. The bill received its first reading.

Mr. Tanton presented a petition from William A. McArthur and others praying for an Act to incorporate "The West Prince Exhibition Association." This bill was read for the first time.

On motion of Mr. M. F. McDonald the bill for an act to amend an act to incorporate the Community Welfare League of Montague, was read a third time and passed.

On motion of Mr. Tanton the bill for an act to incorporate the Forest View Rural Telephone Company, Limited, was read a third time and passed.

On motion of Hon. Mr. Arsenault a bill to incorporate the Summerside Curling Club was read a third time and passed.

On motion of Hon. Mr. MacPhee the bill for an act to be entitled "The Live Stock and Live Stock Products Act of Prince Edward Island" was read a third time and passed.

On motion of Hon. Mr. MacPhee the bill for an act to amend an act to incorporate the Prince Edward Island Dairymen's Association was read a third time and passed.

On motion of Mr. Hunter the bill for an act to incorporate the Trustees of the Union Cemetery, passed its third reading and was passed.

On motion of Mr. M. F. McDonald the bill for an act to consolidate and amend the acts incorporating the Prince Edward Island Protestant Orphanage, was read a third time and passed.

On motion of Hon. Mr. Arsenault a bill to incorporate the Cundall Home was read a second time and committed. Mr. McLean in the chair. The bill was agreed to without amendment.

On motion of Hon. Dr. McMillan the bill for an act to be entitled "The Public Health Act, 1927" was read a second time and committed. Mr. Maynard McDonald in the chair. Progress was reported.

While in the process of considering the Public Health Act, 1927, the hour of adjournment arrived, and house took recess until 8 o'clock in the evening.

In the evening Premier Stewart delivered his budget speech before a House filled to the doors by an interested audience. In the course of an able speech Premier Stewart, read the pledges of the Conservative party before the last election and showed how each was carried out by the Government during their term of office.

Powers Will Adopt Severe Measures Says Chamberlain

(Special to the Guardian) LONDON, Mar. 30.—Foreign Secretary Sir Austen Chamberlain intimated in the House of Commons today that British and the other interested powers would adopt severe measures of protest against last week's incident at Nanking in which foreigners were killed and their property stolen or destroyed by Chinese.

Replying to a question from the labor side in which a member asked what steps the government proposed to take in view of the Nanking incident, Chamberlain said: "The steps which might be proper for the British government and other governments, whose citizens have been treated this way and whose flag had been outraged, are under consideration."
