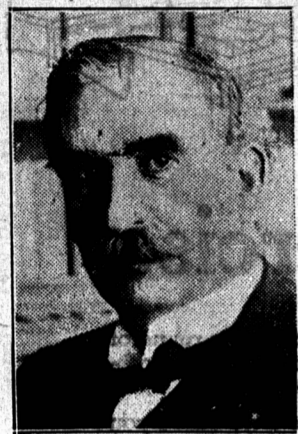

CHICAGO, June 8.—The confession of Nathan F. Leopold, Jr., made public last night by Robert E. Crowe, state's attorney, after the grand jury had indicted Leopold and Richard Loeb, both millionaires' sons and brilliant university graduates.

JURY DISAGREES IN BANK MURDER

Enquired if they Could Bring in a Verdict for Manslaughter—Were Locked up for Night.

MONTREAL, June 8.—At seven o'clock tonight the jury in the trial of Giuseppe Sorafini charged with murder in connection with the hold-up of the Hochelaga Bank collection car here on April 1 when \$142,283 was stolen and two men were shot dead, announced that they had been unable to reach an agreement.

Hydroplane Fell Six Hundred Feet Landing in Rocky Hills.

TOKIO, June 8.—Two Japanese naval officers and three non-commissioned officers were killed and a fourth non-commissioned officer received injuries which are expected to prove fatal, in an air disaster at the Yokosuka naval base on Tokyo Bay, yesterday.

LONDON, June 8.—The Conservatives won a notable victory in the by-election for Oxford yesterday returning their candidate, Captain R. C. Bourne, with a large majority.

Auto Stalled—Six Of Family Killed

GREENEVILLE, Ohio, June 8.—Six persons, virtually the entire family of Adam Pittman of Bradford, were killed late today when their automobile, stalled on the tracks and was demolished by the oncoming Big Four passenger train at Dawn, nine miles north of here.

Gov't. Deadlock Continues in Paris

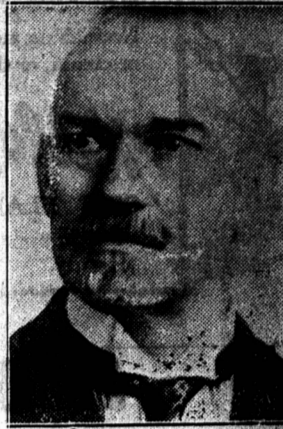

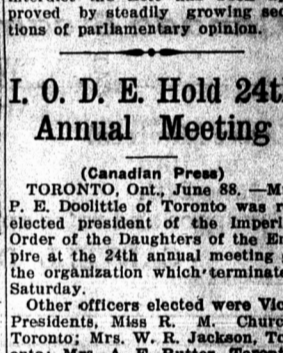
M. P. SUDDENLY STRICKEN

Rescue crews at once entered the workings but their efforts were hampered by a serious fire and cave-ins that followed the explosions.

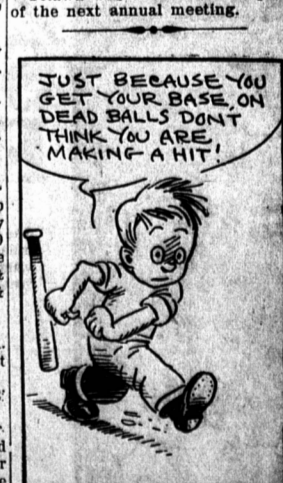
