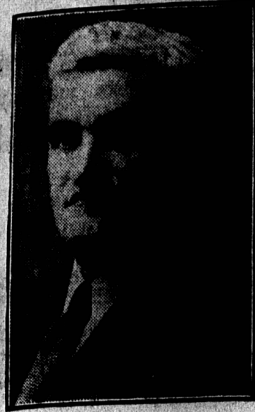

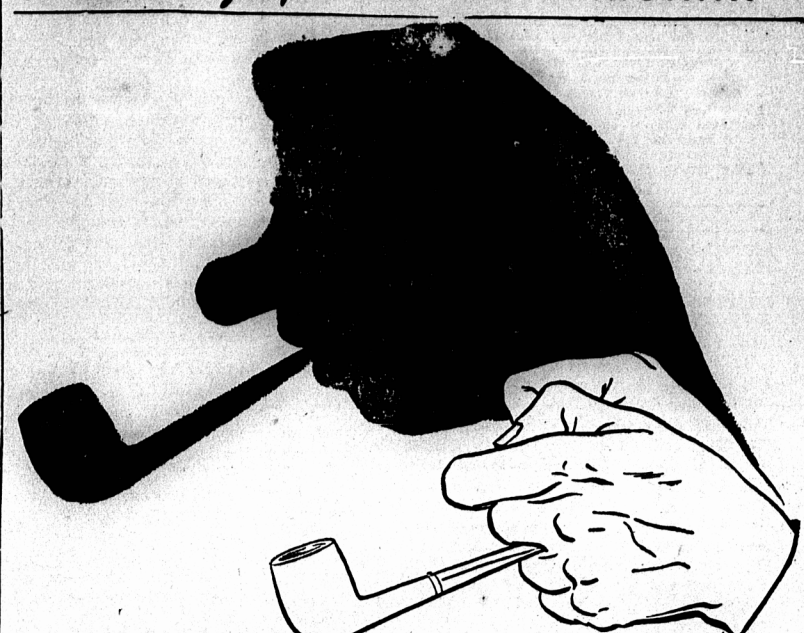

Claxton Addresses Halifax Meeting

HALIFAX, Feb. 20 — (CP) — Federal Health Minister Brooks Claxton said in an address here today that the Family Allowances Act was passed to equalize the salaries of the man with a family and the bachelor.

In a speech prepared for delivery before a service club, Mr. Claxton said the Canadian Family Allowances scale of benefits is the most generous in the world.

Mr. Claxton recalled that in Charlottetown recently he heard that some mothers of large families were unable to send their children to school because of a lack of suitable clothing.

"Family allowances," he declared, "are going to provide these children with a better opportunity for education because they will buy shoes and trousers and shirts and warm winter coats."

Family allowances will help (children) receive the medical attention to get started on the road to a good education.

Commenting on the work of the Department of National Health and Welfare, Mr. Claxton said: "I do not intend to compete with any province or municipality in this field for all of us and we intend to work with all agencies for the health and welfare of the people of Canada."

In the department of health, he said, "we are getting up steam for the long job ahead of us. We are not going to put our coats back on when the war is over."

Wrens Enjoy Good-Night Snacks

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Life Underwriters Hear Report of Toronto Meeting

A special luncheon meeting of the P.E.I. Life Underwriters Association was held in the Charlottetown Hotel on Wednesday afternoon with a representative attendance. The main purpose of the meeting was to hear a report of the Dominion Association's Annual meeting held in Toronto, January 27th, given by Mr. G. Hogg, who was a delegate from the P.E.I. Association.

One of the highlights of Mr. Hogg's report was that approximately 1000 discharged servicemen were enrolled in the rehabilitation course under the direction of the Life Underwriters Association, and many of them have graduated and are now active in the life insurance business.

Another important development shown in the report was the formation of "Agents Committees" to secure closer co-operation between the field staff and the office. The report showed that some companies already had such committees functioning.

In closing the report Mr. Hogg suggested that the local association become a little more service-minded and assist in some worthwhile activity for a betterment of this Province.

An encouraging feature of the report was the fact that the Association's membership has increased from 2300 in 1939 to 3500 at the present time, indicating a remarkable increase of interest in the Association on the part of the Underwriters of Canada.

The President elect, Mr. T. W. Bentley, presided at the meeting and outlined interesting plans for the year. His address was customary to hold meetings in the call of the chair, but it was decided that in the future a regular meeting would be held on the third Wednesday of the month. It was also unanimously decided that the local association offer to supply the teams for the Coming Red Cross Campaign.

Unemployed In France Now Total 600,000

OTTAWA, Feb. 20 — (CP) — The Federal Trade Department has been informed that there are at least 600,000 unemployed in France at the present time, a time when the country's transportation systems had prevented coal and raw material from reaching factories, it was disclosed today.

The department received the information through its commercial intelligence branch which obtained a report on economic conditions in France from Yves Lamontagne, commercial secretary at the Canadian Embassy in Paris.

Mr. Lamontagne also reported that France now has an army of 600,000 men under arms by next spring.

More than 1,000,000 tons of shipping that have been sunk in or near French harbors.

More than 1,000,000 buildings in France have been destroyed or damaged since war started.

Lack of shipping and port facilities during the occupation, from the German invasion of 1940, from Allied aerial bombardments and the number of German destructions by the Germans and by the Allies after D-day and from sabotage by the French themselves to hinder German war efforts.

Coal mines were producing approximately 600,000 tons a week, but the transportation systems could haul less than half of this from the pit heads to the points where it was needed.

Lack of shipping and port facilities decreased the flow of raw materials from other countries. At the outbreak of war France's merchant navy totalled about 3,000,000 tons. The tonnage now available to the French was about 700,000 tons and most of this was controlled by Allied countries. Some French ports still were in German hands and those which were evacuated generally were "systematically and thoroughly destroyed," said Mr. Lamontagne.

Quebec House Debates On Conscription

QUEBEC, Feb. 21 — (CP) — Enforcement of conscription is necessary and is in the interest of French Canadians "since it is in the interest of all Canadians," David Cole (C.C.F. Noranda, Rouyn) said today in the Quebec Legislative Assembly in debate on a motion by Rene Chalouff (C.C.F. Quebec) which protested against conscription for overseas service. The Legislature will sit tonight.

Mr. Chalouff's motion regretted that Prime Minister MacKenzie King had broken "his most sacred pledge."

Mr. Cole said that conscription of capital should have been enforced before conscription of manpower because "if profits are removed from the war, there will be any more wars."

Quebec House Debates On Conscription

OTTAWA, Feb. 21 — (CP) — The Canadian Retail Federation in brief placed before the Ives Royal Commission on taxation, today expressed concern over the possible effect of high personal income tax rates on employment.

It is considered that the present high tax rate the fundamental cause of difficulties experienced by family businesses and closely held corporations as a result of present succession duty and income tax provisions. Should the Dominion act unwilling to suspend the act, dividends or loans to shareholders made to meet succession duties should be made tax-free.

Increased employment in the service industries would be essential to provide adequate housing and employment but economic development by individuals would be frozen if taxes were continued at their present scale.

"Individuals will be discouraged or prevented from starting new businesses which will be necessary if we want a high level of employment for the purpose and secondarily because of the limitations placed upon the rewards for success," the brief said.

The submission was made by W. L. Gordon, Toronto accountant; George S. Hougham, of Toronto, secretary of the Federation and L. A. Burpee of Ottawa, a director.

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Is Critical Of Remote Control In N. S. Industry

HALIFAX, Feb. 20 — (CP) — Criticism was leveled today against the harmful effects of "remote control" of Nova Scotia industries. Ernest G. Irish, Progressive Conservative member for Pictou, today drew sharp rebuke from Attorney-General J.H. MacQuarrie in the Provincial Legislature.

Mr. Irish, referring to the closing down or curtailing of operations of wartime plants, said the Province's industries had suffered "ever since the day and hour that the province or remote control became the dominant force in the industry."

He cited the slackening of work at the Ferguson Brothers shoe-making plant in Pictou as an instance. The Attorney-General replied that negotiations had been underway recently to have control of the plant given back to Pictou interests.

Mr. MacQuarrie added that statements such as those made by Mr. Irish are "incorrect" and harmful to the town and the county of Pictou.

Premier A.S. MacMillan told the House that provincial accounts for the past year will be tabled in the Legislature tomorrow and that members would be given an opportunity to study the accounts before any debate was brought down within a week he said.

Bankers Submit Brief On Taxation

OTTAWA, Feb. 20 — The Canadian Bankers Association in a brief submitted to the Ives Royal Commission on the taxation of annuities and pensions today asked the continuance of legislation which allows contributors to a pension fund to pay income tax on their contributions and receive exemption on their pensions.

Pension plans of the Canadian chartered banks come under this provision. The Association said the average pension being paid to retired bank employees is \$2,100.

The Association was represented by the hearing by S.M. Wedd, general manager of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, and president of the Association, and O.F.H. Carson, counsel.

The brief said most of the chartered banks of Canada operate pension funds for the benefit of their employees with membership usually continued to male employees on a contributory basis. Contributions from the employees range from 10 to 15 per cent and in most cases are substantially larger amounts paid into the funds by the banks.

The Association said it was estimated 100,000 persons in transportation, industry and finance were under pension plans similar to those operated by the banks. Present income tax law allows an opt-

Testify Prisoner Severely Beaten In Montreal Jail

MONTREAL, Feb. 20 — (CP) — Patrick Carroll, former prisoner at Montreal jail, testified at the murder hearing of Rene Lavoie and Marcel Bonneau today that Gerard Lauson was severely beaten in the prison infirmary last May, half an hour after he was taken to the jail for a mental examination.

Lavoie, former guard at the jail, and Bonneau, a former prisoner, are charged with murder in connection with Lauson's death.

Carroll testified that he was in the infirmary when Lavoie and Bonneau, who was acting as an aide to the guards, told Lauson to strip for a shower. He said that when Lauson demurred at undressing before the 32 other inmates of the infirmary, Bonneau and "Freche" — another prisoner later adjudged insane — beat him under certain conditions, as to whether tax will be imposed on contributors and the pensions be tax free or whether the contributors will be exempt and the pension taxed. The Association took the position that taxation of contributions and exemption for pensions was more preferable.

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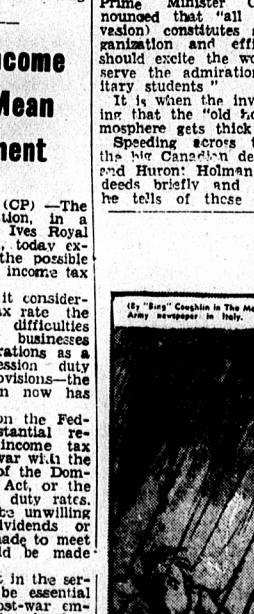
